Joseph Crane Hartzell, Methodist bishop of Africa, will speak at the First Methodist church in Moline tomorrow evening on "Nation Building in Africa." The reverend gentleman is to spend a short time in Moline, the guest of his mother, Mrs. Nancy Hartzell, who resides near Eighth avenue and Fifteenth street. No objections were filed in the county clerk's office this afternoon up to 3:30 o'clock against the proposed paving improvement on Fifteenth street, and, as this is the last day for serving of such notice of objection, it is evident that the improvement is to be allowed to go ahead without being delayed by any legal contest. The members of the Moline chautauqua committee and Manager Lardner, of the Tri-City Railway company, went out to Prospect park this morning and staked out the location for the monster new auditorium which the railway company is to erect at the park for the chautauqua. The structure is to be completed by the first of July. Lawrence Cockwell was tried as to his sanity in the county court Monday afternoon by a commission composed of Drs. E. A. Soule and E. D. Taylor. Cockwell, who resides at Sunny Hill and has been employed as laborer at New Shops, was adjudged insane in Henry county about a year ago and after a short term spent in the Watertown hospital was discharged as cured. He was ordered by Judge Parmenter to be sent back to the hospital. More than half the right of way for the Geneseo, Cambridge and Kewanee line have been secured. Nearly all the right of way between Cambridge and Geneseo have been signed for and the work is now confined to the territory between Cambridge and Kewanee with a part of it already granted. He was warned by others, but the dirt caught him about the hips and he was held till help released him. The ambulance was summoned to remove him to his home, 723 Third street. He is only slightly hurt. OLD RIVER CAPTAIN VISITS IN ROCK ISLAND Capt. W. H. Pierce, a former resident of this city and the oldest pilot and engineer on the Mississippi river, is spending a few days in this city visiting friends and recalling the roseate days of old when the river trade was at its height. Capt. Pierce came up the river on the Helen Blair today with Capt. Walter Blair, the latter having enjoyed the first steamboat ride of his life on Capt. Pierce's steamer, the Jennie Brown, the first short line packet boat, in 1873, riding from Davenport to Le Claire and back. The captain's tales of river adventure would fill a volume. He was on the McDonald, the Van Sant steamer which blew up at North McGregor in 1872, killing 20 out of 30 on board. Capt. Pierce had a number of ribs and bones broken at that time and was otherwise injured. His was the lot to see the inception of the upper Mississippi traffic, its rise and fall. His first trip was made in 1814, coming up as far as Rock Island on the old Lynx when he was but 10 or 11 years old. That steamer was an old-fashioned side-wheel, single-engine affair. Later he saw the growth of the Northern and White Collar lines and for a time served as agent for the Northern line at Burlington. He is at present living with his son at Gilchrist.

HAD MAD DOG SCARE IN DRURY TOWNSHIP In Drury township the people are just getting over a mad dog scare which was started over a week ago by a dog belonging to Carl Witt. Mrs. Witt, who first noticed that the animal was acting strangely, tried to make an examination to learn what was the matter, when the canine leaped at her and bit her on the arm. It subsequently bit several dogs and a number of cattle before being put out of the way. Mrs. Witt's wound was a very slight one, but she was at once given treatment calculated to remove the poison if the dog was really mad. A great many stories have been circulated concerning cases in which symptoms of hydrophobia were shown, but all have proved without foundation and it is believed that there never was any real cause for alarm.
