## PREPARE TO LEAVE

Amish People Will Remove From Vicinity of Bloomington.

GO TO WESTERN PART OF STATE

Are Looking for Cheaper Lands and Less Hostile Surroundings.

Central Illinois is about to lose the queer people known as the Amish, now located in a colony near Bloomington. While all may not go, it is certain that a considerable number have decided to leave. It has been learned that agents have been busily engaged for several months in buying land in western Illinois, a few miles south of Keokuk, Ia., in what is known as the Lima lake district. Options have been secured upon 10,000 acres of the best tracts in the vicinity and fully \$30,000 paid to hold them, demonstrating that there is abundance of means behind the buyers. Land can be bought in the vicinity mentioned all the way from \$25 to \$45 per acre.

It is presumed that the enormous increase in the cost of central Illinois lands has something to do with the exodus. Some farms there have sold this year at from \$175 to \$190 per acre, the increase in the past five years ranging from \$50 to \$100 per acre. The unfriendliness of the people in the vicinity toward their religion may have something to do with the departure. Ever since the Sam Morse murder there has been more or less feeling throughout central Illinois against the Amish and their tenets of faith, and the recent suicide of Frederick Schultz, has revived the talk.

The purchase of so much land near Keokuk has created a vast amount of speculation there as to the probable effect the colonization will have upon the agricultural, religious, political and commercial situation there. The Lima lake district is close to the junction of three states. The heavy purchase of lands has greatly increased the value of all property in the vicinity. The Amish sect is communistic in many ways and is governed more by the laws of the church than by those of the state. The members are not allowed to participate in wars and their home furnishings must be severely plain, no carpets being allowed upon the floors nor pictures or fancy wall paper upon the walls.

Wives and husbands must be selected by the church and after marriage the couple must live apart one week before being permitted to remain together. A husband is not allowed to fondle or kiss his wife and children in public. Bishops, elders and preachers are chosen by lot and must serve without pay. Members are forbidden to go to law, and while property is made out in the name of individuals it must be considered as belonging to the community. No member is permitted to have his or her photograph taken.

The particular teachings of the faith are the subject of much comment, as the result of the suicide of Frederick Schultz, after making an effort to murder his entire family.

Story of Schultz.

Schultz was worth \$100,000 at the time of his death. It is alleged that when two of his daughters became believers in the Amish religion they left the Lutheran church and also succeeded in taking their mother with them. Schultz could not be persuaded to follow them and this invited trouble. When Mrs. Schultz joined the church she is said to have been forbidden by the preacher to have anything more to do with her husband or the other members of the family who remained outside the pale of the church. While living in the same house with them, she was not allowed to speak with them or eat at the same table. She was also directed not to wait upon them in case of sickness, nor attend their funeral if they should die.

She obeyed this order faithfully. It is said, and Schultz became subject to fits of temporary insanity, due to constant brooding over the ostracism. It has developed that the same pastor who commanded Mrs. Schultz to give up her husband also excommunicated Sam Moser, of Tazewell county, who killed his entire family because they were ordered to have nothing to do with him until he joined the Amish church. Moser is serving a life sentence for his crime.
