## DAVENPORT DOTS

At 11 o'clock Wednesday morning after a long illness occurred the death of Fritz Graack, aged 36 years. The deceased was born in Ames, Germany, Oct. 12, 1848, and came to Davenport in 1872. For a time he was employed in the studio of his father R. Graack, the photographer. Later he became an accountant and expert bookkeeper.

Thursday at the home of his sister, Mrs. George F. McGuirk, 1827 Bowditch street, occurred the death of David Kennedy in the early '30's of his years. The deceased up to four weeks ago was a resident of Chicago, where he was employed as a foreman in a paper box factory. Besides his sister in this city, he is survived by three brothers, Thomas, John and Joseph Kennedy, of Chicago.

William L. Bowers has entered suit against the United States Express company, and Harry M. J. Lamb, co-defendant, wherein he asks to be awarded the sum of \$5,000 because of injuries received, which he alleges have disabled him. It is alleged that defendant Lamb drove along East Third street between Perry and Brady streets while the plaintiff was standing on the edge of a steam pipe trench in a stooping position. He says that the establishment of sewer districts in these wards is an imperative necessity and should be the first work taken up now that the waterworks improvement is approaching completion. The council expects to take advantage of the new law in providing districts, the property owners in each district sharing alike in the cost no matter whether a six-inch or 18-inch pipe is laid in front of their property.

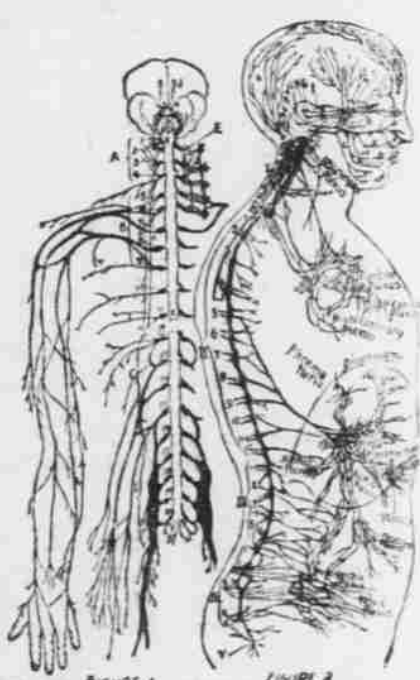
