## TALK OF NEW LINE

Milwaukee Road Planning to Build From Peoria Here.

### ABOUT TO ASK A FRANCHISE

Object Said to be to Improve Company's North and South Service.

In Peoria it is reported that a new line of railroad from Rock Island to Peoria is being planned by the Milwaukee. It is said that the matter has gone so far that everything is ready to ask Peoria for a franchise. But little is known of the intentions of the promoters of the new line, further than it is rumored that it will extend from Peoria to Rock Island, and that the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul people are behind it.

It has been known that the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul people have desired an entrance into Peoria for a number of years, and even more so since its rival, the Chicago & North-western came in. A branch line is now under construction from the main line at Davis Junction to McNabb, in Putnam county, where the company owns a large amount of coal lands.

### Compete With Others.

McNabb is but a few miles from Peoria, and it is surmised that should the company come to Peoria it would be by an extension to this new division. However, rumor has it that the new line is to extend from Peoria to this city and here connect with the present lines and to compete with the Rock Island, the Burlington, and the Iowa Central—Minneapolis and St. Louis lines.

### WORLD'S FAIR SPECIAL COINS ARE NOW ON S. L.

Coins issued by the United States mint at Philadelphia to commemorate the Louisiana Purchase exposition are now on sale. This coinage will be known as the Louisiana Purchase gold dollar and was provided for by a specific act of congress to memorialize the great world's fair of 1904. The coins are pronounced by numismatists the finest examples of the coinage art. Their issue will be limited to 250,000 pieces and they will be delivered complete to the exposition commissioners, representing a part of Uncle Sam's appropriation of \$5,000,000 to the exposition.

The coins are of two types: two obverses having the same reverse; 125,000 having an excellent likeness of Thomas Jefferson, government father of the Louisiana purchase, and 125,000 having the profile of William McKinley, government father of the Louisiana Purchase exposition.

The various jewelry mountings that may be had make the official souvenir adaptable for gift purposes. The proceeds from the sale of the coins will be employed for general exposition purposes and those assisting in their sale will not only evince a worthy patriotism, but will be direct contributors to what promises to be the greatest of world's fairs.
