Washington, May 10.—The department of commerce has just published a report of United States Consul Hill at Amsterdam, Netherlands, on United States flour in the Netherlands. Hill states that Russian wheat is responsible for quite a loss to the United States miller this year, as the crop was large in Russia, and owing to the fear of war it was rushed quickly to market.

Other Lake Boats Get Away.

Port Arthur, Ont., May 10.—The first boat out of here this season is the Neepawa, which took on 90,000 bushels of grain at the Canadian Northern elevator, got out beyond the cape and clear of all ice in about three hours. The Midland Queen followed, leaving Port William about an hour later. All boats can get in and out of the harbor here.

TALK OF HOLDING UNION MEETINGS

Protestant Churches to Meet Tomorrow Evening and Consider the Plan.

Protestants of the city are discussing the advisability of bringing an evangelist to Rock Island to hold a series of meetings. It is not the plan to wage an aggressive campaign, but to make the aim of the meeting the spiritual upbuilding of the churches joining in the same, after the manner followed in a number of the larger cities recently.

A union meeting will be held tomorrow evening at the Memorial Christian church for the purpose of formally considering the matter. The other churches that will be represented are the Broadway, United and Central Presbyterian, First Methodist and First Baptist. A song sermon will be delivered by Rev. Alfred Fowler, an evangelist and lecturer of note whom there is talk of bringing here to conduct the proposed meetings.

If the meetings are held they will be in the open air at some convenient place or in a tent.

MURDER WITHOUT A CAUSE

One Italian Shoots and Instantly Kills Another Without Any Known Provocation.

Spring Valley, Ill., May 10.—In a Dakota street saloon Peter Boggioshot and instantly killed Rudolph Lanzl. Both are Italians. The shooting was without any provocation, as shown at the coroner's inquest in the saloon where the murder took place.

Chief of Police Hicks, of Spring Valley, arrested Boggio as he was attempting to get out of town. The prisoner was turned over to Sheriff Elliott, of Bureau county, and lodged in Princeton jail to await the action of the grand jury.

Young Woman Is Missing.

Indianapolis, May 10.—The police have been informed that Miss Leonora Stephenson, 2018 Prospect street, is missing, not having been home since she left for church Sunday morning. Miss Stephenson's brother is treasurer of Fletcher Place church, but he was sick Sunday, and she took the collections for him. After taking charge of the money at three services she left the church and did not return home. Anxiety was felt for her and the police have been asked to look for her.
