## HIT DIVORCE EVIL

Two Bills That Have Been Introduced in State Legislature.

### STATISTICS ARE STARTLING

Laws Proposed to Check Abuse in Practice—Figures From Various Counties.

The growth of the divorce evil and the agitation in favor of a check begun by the national organizations of the various church societies has been made the subject of considerable study by Representative Walter M. Provine of Christian county to secure material for support of his house bill. Mr. Provine has introduced in the legislature a measure prohibiting a person against whom a divorce decree has been issued from marrying again within two years unless the party granted the decree should die before the expiration of that period. The bill further provides that in any violation of the law the violator shall be deemed guilty of bigamy and such marriage shall be declared void.

There are other bills in the house which may contain provisions that will appear more forcibly to the members of the judiciary committee, to which the bill has been referred.

Bill Presented by Allen.

The second bill introduced at this session was an anti-divorce act by Representative Allen of Vermilion, giving the court authority to forbid the offending party in a suit from marrying before the expiration of five years, or even ten years, in the court's discretion. Should the person on whom the limitation is placed violate the order of the court, he or she is liable, under the terms of the bill, to imprisonment for the unexpired time under the court's order.

Mr. Provine is so thoroughly convinced that the spread of the evil is a menace to the state that he has gone to the trouble of gathering statistics from every county. These show that during the last year 2,312 divorces were granted in 93 counties. The counties from which he was able to secure any returns were Cook, Clinton, Fulton, Macoupin, Madison, Perry, Pike, Richland and Saline. In Cook county alone it is estimated that the number of divorces granted annually will reach 3,000, so the total of divorces for the entire state in 1904 exceeded 5,000 against 1,071 in 1897.
