**BEGIN THE GOSSIP**

**Congressional Succession Already a Matter of Discussion.**

**NO DEARTH OF CANDIDATES**

Rock Island Will Probably Have Internal Strife—Candidate From Every County—McKinney Is In.

The vacant seat in the Fourteenth congressional district, of which the news passed about the district today, has precipitated a general discussion of the succession. It now seems probable that every county in the district will have a candidate. A special election will have to be called to fill the vacancy.

Rock Island will probably have at least two candidates for the office. Judge Charles J. Searle, of Rock Island, is mentioned in connection with the nomination, and who Moline's worthy son will be not yet known. When Charles P. Skinner was made mayor of Moline it was then considered a stepping stone to higher aspirations, but what Mr. Skinner's position is with reference to the congressional situation is not known. Burton F. Peek is another man for whom many are speaking, and it is possible that he will be found in the contest, although he has not made any statement himself with reference to it. Frank G. Allen of Moline and Hon. William McConochie are also among those discussed in this connection.

**McKinney Is Candidate.**

It is understood that James McKinney, of Aledo, who is a member of the republican state central committee from this district, will be active in the canvass for the nomination. George C. Rankin, of Monmouth, is one of Warren county's strong men, and although he is now occupying a position at Washington he may become involved in the deal before it is over.

The position of Lieut. Gov. Sherman is not known. It is stated that if his ambitions go beyond the limits of his own state they have recently developed. At the time of the redistricting of the state his interests were to be considered, but at that time he did not seem to be ambitious in that direction. If the lieutenant governor's office is a bar against his ever being governor, he may want to go to congress.
