S. Vinall by Attorney J. A. Hanley, notifying him that a damage suit in the sum of \$2,000 would be filed against him by David Goeke. Mr. Goeke occupied one of the houses owned by Mr. Vinall on Twelfth and Le Claire streets which collapsed Saturday night. He also occupied the adjoining carpenter shop. Mr. Goeke claims the above damages for the loss of furniture and household goods, together with the wearing apparel of himself, wife and five children, together with the pain and anguish suffered by them by reason of the building collapsing. It is claimed by the plaintiff that the buildings were improperly constructed, unsafe and unfit for human habitation. Eimer Wheeler, the occupant of the other building, which went over at the same time, has also instructed Attorney Hanley to enter suit for him against Mr. Vinall.

Broke Open Car.
James McMahon and Harry Malone are held on the serious charge of breaking and entering. The two men were arrested by the Rock Island railway detectives, and are accused of breaking the seal of a car in the western yards of the C. R. I. & P. containing a shipment of mineral water. The men, it is presumed, thought the car contained bottled beer in cases, and to secure some of the beverage was the supposed motive for the act. Under the law the breaking of a car seal and the effecting of an entrance into a car is an indictable offense and serious in its consequences.

At his home, 935 Brown street, Sunday night occurred the death of Jimmy Scott (colored), at the age of 21 years. Deceased will be remembered as the unfortunate lad who several years ago had one of his arms blown off by the premature explosion of a giant firecracker. His death was due to heart disease and dropsy.

MILL CLOSES TEMPORARILY

Partial Suspension of Republic Steel Works in a Week.
The eight-inch mill at the Sylvan plant of the Republic Iron & Steel company will be closed in about a week and about fifteen men will be thrown out of work temporarily. The 12-inch mill will be run till the middle of the summer. The scale of wages agreed upon by the representatives of the company and the employees at Detroit last week does not affect the plant here, for the men work under a separate agreement.

Goes to Convention.
E. B. Knox, treasurer of the Illinois State Undertakers' association, departed this morning for Springfield, where the 25th annual convention will be held. Mr. Knox goes to the capitol city armed with literature with which to advertise Moline. He hopes to capture the 1906 convention for this city. A year ago an invitation was extended the undertakers to meet here, but Chicago delegates voted Moline down.

Arrangements have been completed by which the crack Red Men ball team of Kewanee will come here next Sunday to play a game with a local team which has been organized out of four Moline tribes. The game will be played at Athletic park.

Eighteen children comprised the confirmation class that graduated in the Mission tabernacle Sunday morning when a public examination was conducted by the pastor. This class has been under the pastor's charge since last October and now with the completion of the course they are in readiness to unite with the church.

Tried to Run Cars.
Trouble brewed Saturday night on one of the Prospect park line street cars and George Draper and Harry Gibson assaulted the conductor, Dave Harrah. Yesterday morning the two young pugilists appeared before Justice P. R. Ingleson and contributed \$8.45 apiece to the city's coffers.

Change Cattle Shipments.
Ever since the establishment of Natiek yards in the east end of Moline a serious question of tracks has always been experienced every Sunday evening. This congestion is caused by the great number of stock trains which come from the west bound for Chicago. Shippers of cattle in the west ship a train load of cattle so that it can reach Natiek Sunday afternoon and evening and then reach Chicago easily some time Monday. The management of the Rock Island railway has tried several ways of eliminating this congestion of the yards and now have decided on a new plan. The railway company is endeavoring to secure as many of the heavy cattle shippers as possible to agree to not ship their stock the latter part of the week and thus distribute the traffic more evenly throughout the week.
