MINOR MAGNATE IS OUT. Howard Griffith, Baseball Disturber, Put Under the Ban. Cincinnati, Ohio, Aug. 16.—After the national baseball commission had been called to order yesterday afternoon a resolution reciting recent action of the National association in regard to Howard Griffiths, was read, in which it was announced that Griffiths had been "summarily removed" from all connection with the National association from the national board of arbitration.

The commission had met to hear the charge of Judge Kavanaugh, president of the Southern league and member of the national board of arbitration, against Howard Griffiths, also a member of the National Association of Professional Base Ball clubs, charging him with conspiring to break the national agreement by seeking to array all the minor leagues against the National and American leagues unless certain concessions were granted to minor leagues.

Some weeks ago the commission prepared to try Mr. Griffiths, but he secured an injunction to prevent such action. This was in Cleveland. It was feared that another injunction would be served at the meeting today to prevent the hearing of the charges of Judge Kavanaugh.
