DAVENPORT DOTS.

Factories Pile Up Coal.—The railroads and big factories are not quite so optimistic as Eugene V. Debs on the prospects of a coal strike. When Mr. Debs was in Davenport last week he gave it as his opinion that the miners and operators would settle their differences without a strike being declared. But the railroads and big factories are evidently of the belief that in time of plenty they should prepare for famine, so far as the coal supply is concerned, and consequently more coal is coming into the tri-cities than at any other time during the winter. The Glucose Sugar Refining company is receiving eight or ten carloads per day and already has two piles large enough to serve as breastworks for an army. In one pile between the company's plant and the old city cemetery are about 200 carloads, and another enormous pile has been stacked up just west of the can plant. It is expected the piles will be kept growing the greater part of this month. The glucose company uses about three carloads per day and would therefore be seriously crippled in case of a strike. The American Can company is another big coal user that is storing a large quantity of coal. Its heavy season comes in the summer time when the canning plants are running and the demand for cans is constant and heavy. None of the canning factories have facilities for storing anything like the number of cans they use during the season and for that reason a crippled can plant would cause widespread trouble. The can company's coal pile now contains about 75 carloads of lump coal and it is still coming.

Becker a Candidate.—Hon. Waldo Becker has announced that he would accept the democratic nomination for mayor, if nominated at tomorrow evening's convention, to be held at Turner hall. Mr. Becker said: "For a month past I have been besieged at my office and stopped upon the street by persons inquiring whether or not I was going to enter the race for mayor. To all of them I replied that I was not a candidate and moreover was not seeking the nomination. During the past few days I have been prevailed upon by numerous leading democrats and prominent citizens to become a candidate. After due consideration I have decided to accept the nomination if tendered. Moreover, if nominated, I am not afraid of the outcome and feel confident that I can be elected."

Attorney Ely Married.—A wedding that will interest the many friends of the couple was that of Attorney N. D. Ely, and Mrs. Mabel Von Schaezler, which took place Sunday afternoon at the latter's home in the McCaffrey flats. The ceremony was performed exactly at 3:30 o'clock by Judge James Bollinger and was witnessed by only a few relatives and very intimate friends. Mr. and Mrs. Ely will make their home in the McCaffrey flats. They will not take a honeymoon trip until later, as Mr. Ely is very busy at present with several law matters that preclude his absence from the city.

Chased Out of Missouri.—E. M. Pritchard, a white man and Lizzie Pritchard, his colored wife, were both arrested Sunday by Night Capt. Tim Mullane and Officer Sanford, charged with disturbing the peace. The couple have lived in Davenport for but three weeks, being tenants of Max Reuben's house on Harrison street between Sixth and Seventh. Saturday night both became intoxicated and kept up such a noise that toward the early hours of morning the neighbors lodged complaint at the police station and the couple were taken in tow by the officers and brought to the station. At the station the woman told Night Capt. Tim Mullane that they had but recently come here from Missouri, having been chased out of that state by the officials who informed her husband that they would not tolerate a white man married to a colored woman to live in their midst. In police court the husband and wife appeared with their baby girl, a mere tot of 2 or 3 years of age. Both parties were fined \$1 and costs and allowed to return to their home.

U. S. Life Endowment Company Has Many Advantages.
John Brown had an insurance policy for \$5,000; he also had a wife and three small children. One morning he was found dead in his bed. His wife drew the insurance in a lump. 
