SONG IN SQUARE

Devotions Held in Popular Park and Hundreds in Attendance.

MAY HOLD SUMMER VESPERS

Dr. C. T. Wheeler Tells of Reputations Attached to Cities and Says Davenport Is Beer City.

MEETINGS TONIGHT.

The sight of several hundred people gathered in Spencer square at 6:30 last evening, singing and conducting a religious service, was indeed a beautiful one, and one that was quite strange in Rock Island.

The vesper service was held in the square by the committee of the central district, though all of the young people's societies of the city united there. There were present about 500 young people and church members, and scores of pedestrians who gathered in the square from curiosity remained with bowed heads and listened to the simple service. Several hymns were sung, and Alexander Davidson, the singing evangelist, sang a solo. Announcements of various church services of the evening were made by Dr. W. S. Marquis, pastor of the Broadway Presbyterian church, and Rev. D. L. McNary of the United Presbyterian church led in prayer.

Rev. Tilman Hobson in a brief talk thanked the city authorities for permitting the service, and suggested that the evening vesper service be made a regular incident during the summer. This idea will probably be carried out, it originated with Dr. Marquis. The young people were dismissed, and as they formed lines and marched to the various churches, they sang "The

King's Business," an evangelistic song that is becoming famous.

"City of Beer."

Rev. C. T. Wheeler, in the eastern district, spoke at the Spencer Memorial church, addressing as usual a large audience. It was necessary to open the entire church auditorium and the Sunday school room to provide seating. "Falseness" was the evangelist's subject for the evening.

Dr. Wheeler in the course of his address called attention to the fact that we naturally connect certain characteristics with certain cities. Davenport, he said, was thought of at once as a beer city, Clay Center as the chicken city, Pittsburg as the city of smoke, and other illustrations were cited. He did not, however, say just what connecting thought was attached to Rock Island.

Speaking of the excuse presented by some that on account of their business they can not be Christians, he declared this to be a lie; that a man, in a legitimate business, can certainly be a Christian.

Works Like Phonograph.

Dr. Tilman Hobson conducted the central district service at the First Methodist church, speaking on the subject of "Death." "We must all appear before God on the judgment day, and every man and woman who rejects Christ now is already condemned to everlasting death," said the speaker in opening his sermon. In the course of his discourse Dr. Hobson said, "God's greatest sermons are found outside of the pale of the church, particularly in science." In this connection he used the phonograph as an illustration, likening the phonograph to the records of the recording angel. "As the phonograph records your words and spoken thoughts, so is every thought and action recorded in heaven, and on the judgment day read forth in thunder tones for you to answer to."

Example of Moses.

Many of those who went to the Memorial Christian church last evening were unable to gain entrance, every available seat and standing room being taken. Dr. D. S. Toy delivered a strong sermon on the subject, "The Choice of Moses."

Dr. Toy took as his text Hebrews XI, 24:27, in which the decision of Moses to reject the honor and position of a prince of Egypt is mentioned. He briefly told the story of Moses' life, dividing it into three periods, the first 40 years as a member of the household of Pharaoh, the next 40 years in seclusion and preparation, and the 40 years in the wilderness journeys. He pointed out that Moses made the important decision of his life before the age of 40, and Dr. Toy added, "You find that in nearly every case in the present day the decision to accept Christ is made before that age. The decision must be made, and it results either in glory or despair."

MORE HONORS FOR BROWN

Former Rock Island Railroad Man Head of American Association.

William C. Brown now elected president of the American Railway association, has been conspicuous for years in railroad affairs, having been connected with various lines in several capacities. He now is first vice president and a director of the New York Central, and also is an official of the American Steel Foundries company. Mr. Brown was born in 1853 in Herkimer county, New York, and began his railway career when but 16 years old. He has been general manager of the Burlington system from which he went to the Lake Shore in the same capacity. Since then he has climbed rapidly.

NEW CHURCH SITE

Central Presbyterian Congregation Seeking Another Place of Worship.

TRUSTEES ARE TO DECIDE

Members Have Four Sites Under Consideration—In Eastern Residence District—To Erect Church.

A congregational meeting of the Central Presbyterian church was held Saturday evening for the purpose of discussing the advisability of removing the church from its present quarters to a new building to be erected in a more favorable part of the city. The church, standing as it does adjoining the railway yards and the Burlington round-house, and with the noise of Second avenue, has been found to be in an undesirable location, and the congregation almost unanimously favors removal to a better site in the residence district.

Consider Four Sites.

Four sites were considered, they being the northeast corner of Fourteenth street and Eleventh avenue, 80x127 feet; the northeast corner of Twelfth street and Eleventh avenue, 90x120 feet; the southeast corner of Fourteenth street and Eleventh avenue, 85x133 feet, and the southeast corner of Twelfth street and Eleventh avenue, 90x133 feet.

The congregation decided to leave to the church board of trustees the selection and purchase of one of these locations, the details of preparation for the erection of a new church building and the disposition of the present structure. The board of trustees meets tomorrow evening to consider the matter.
