### WAS REMARKABLE ASCENSION

## NAME COMMITTEE

Council Orders Thorough Investigation of Telephone Matters

### CONSIDERING AMENDMENT

Report on Accounts of Company and Rates Elsewhere — Turn Down Waste Paper Box Plan.

At the adjourned meeting of the city council last evening, in committee of the whole, a special committee composed of C. C. Wilson, A. G. Anderson, R. C. Benson, Charles Smith, and F. E. Robbins, with the mayor and city attorney, was appointed to make an investigation of conditions bearing on the proposed amendment to the telephone ordinance under which the new telephone company is operating. The committee is instructed, by a resolution of the council, to determine the capital invested here by the company, the cost of maintenance and operation of the system, the earnings, to gather data regarding rates under similar conditions elsewhere, and to present a written opinion of the city attorney on the existing ordinance and the proposed amendment.

The question of the proposed relief was not extensively discussed last evening, the consideration being confined largely as to the legality of amending the franchise ordinance, and the best methods to be followed in settling the question of rates and the franchise tax.

#### The Company's Representatives.

H. W. Miller, general auditor of the telephone company, and E. J. Burns, the general manager of the exchange here, were present, and explained the company's situation, offering to give their own services and those of the entire office force to assist the council in such an investigation as is to be made. City Attorney Olsen expressed himself as skeptical of the advantage of any examination of the company's books, but the council and the mayor were inclined to accept the assurance of the company's representatives that access will be had to all of the books, and every detail shown. The committee will begin its work shortly and will make an exhaustive report to the council.

The question of party lines will probably be embodied in the report, as when the matter was brought up last evening Mr. Burns stated that it is the plan of the company to install such service to meet the demands for telephones at cheaper rates than would exist should the maximum rate be increased.

#### No Waste Paper Boxes.

The council took up the proposed ordinance providing for the erection of waste paper boxes by R. H. Taylor or his assigns, and after a thorough discussion the council, as a committee of the whole, voted to report adversely on the ordinance. The proposition was in every sense an advertising scheme, the ordinance submitted providing that Mr. Taylor should have exclusive privilege of installing such boxes in the city for 10 years, and that he should have the exclusive right to the advertising space on these boxes. This advertising feature is what the council objected to, and it was on account of the general objection to this kind of advertising that the council acted unfavorably on the ordinance. Without advertising, the boxes might be a benefit, but with this feature the boxes would probably prove a nuisance, was the position of the council.

### RATES TO THE CONVENTION

Railroads Prepare to Handle Traffic for Political Gatherings.

The Burlington has announced special rates for the political conventions which are to be held this month. A rate of one fare for the round trip will be in effect for the state republican convention at Springfield, and a similar rate will be given for the democratic state convention at Peoria, also for the congressional convention at Alledo. The rate to Alledo is good on train No. 48 leaving Rock Island Thursday morning, Aug. 16 at 6:45 and returning leave Alledo in the afternoon at 4 o'clock.

## LOOK INTO DEATH

Suspicion of Foul Play Connected With Death of Mrs. Glancey at Alledo.

### INQUEST HELD TOMORROW

Husband Did Not Tell of Hanging Till After Physician Noticed Marks on Neck.

Alledo, Ill., Aug. 9.—(Special).—Additional mysterious circumstances have been found to surround the death of Mrs. Clay Glancey, who died here yesterday morning as a result of a hemorrhage, following an alleged attempt at suicide. Developments in the case today lead the authorities to believe that she may have been the victim of foul play and the inquest has been continued until tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock. It was only after an examination by the physician in charge who noticed marks on her throat, that, in explanation the husband said that he had found her hanging in an outhouse and that she had tried to commit suicide.

The fact that she was taken with a hemorrhage together with the marks on her throat appears mysterious and the case will be investigated.

#### Killed by Train.

Alledo, Ill., Aug. 9.—(Special).—John Thomason of Joy, a brother of L. D. Thomason, the well known lawyer here was killed by a train at Buda yesterday afternoon while enroute to Chicago with a shipment of stock. He was one of the prominent residents of Mercer county.

### MUST NOT SHOOT CHICKENS

Season for Them Will Not Be Open Till 1909 According to Law.

Many sportsmen are under the impression that prairie chickens will have an open season next year, 1907, but such is not the case. In July, 1903, the state legislature passed a law exempting prairie chickens for four years, and the last session of the legislature took the matter up again and added another four years, so it will be unlawful to kill prairie chickens before the year 1909.
