

TO MAKE NO MORE OFFICERS' LEGGINS HERE Ordnance Department Decides to Discontinue Practice at Rock Island Arsenal. The discontinuance of the manufacture of pigskin and collar leather leggings at Rock Island arsenal is the subject of an Associated Press dispatch this afternoon, General Crozier having announced at Washington the decision to stop the practice. The decision is of little importance, however, as the average output of these articles at the arsenal has been less than 10 pairs a month. The leggings are part of the officers' uniforms, and it has been the practice to make these at the arsenal from measurements provided by the officers. The leggings were not issued, but were sold to the officers. It has been found impossible for the government to compete with the machine product made in quantities, as the work here is done entirely by hand. The officers will now have to secure the leggings of manufacturers, and will be compelled to accept stock sizes instead of the leggings made to order by the government. WANT JURY INSTRUCTED Motion to Find Issues for Defense in Rickart Case is Argued. The attorneys for the defendants in the Rickart damage case this afternoon are arguing a motion for the court to instruct the jury for the defense. The

motion was filed on the grounds that the plaintiff had failed to show the liability of the three defendants, the Moline Printing company, Cox Bros., and the city of Moline. ### FAVOR PLAN FOR A LECTURE COURSE

Committee Secures 100 of Required 150 Subscriptions to Secure Series by Professor Raymond.

The effort being made by Rev. W. S. Marquis, H. E. Brown, and H. B. Hayden to arrange for a university extension lecture course of lectures by Jerome H. Raymond of the Chicago university, is meeting with the favor of those to whom the committee has presented the matter, and already about 100 of the required 150 subscriptions have been secured. The committee will require 150 subscriptions of \$2 each to secure the course, the subscription entitles the subscriber to four transferable tickets for the course. The lectures are on "European Capitals and Their Moral Significance." Such a course was given in this city some years ago. The lectures are illustrated. The indications are that the arrangements will be made for the course, to begin early in the new year.
