Hollow Glass Bricks.

The demand for hollow bricks and building blocks for house construction has induced glass manufacturers to put hollow glass bricks on the market, and they promise to be used extensively for novel and artistic effects, says the Building Magazine. The first glass bricks, being sold, proved a failure on account of their cost, but the hollow glass bricks can be made at a much less expense. They are lighter and stronger than clay bricks and are such excellent nonconductors that walls built of them are proof against dampness, sound, heat and cold. The bricks are sealed hermetically when hot and are placed in walls with a colorless mortar made of special glass. The bonding strength of the glass mortar is almost as great as the bricks themselves.

CASE IS FINISHED

Jury is Out in the Trial of Clif-
ford Anderson for Burg-
lary and Larceny.

JUDGE GRANTS DIVORCES

Two Wives and One Husband Freed
from Matrimonial Bonds—Two
New Bills Are Filed.

The case against Clifford Anderson was concluded this afternoon and given to the jury at 3 o'clock. Anderson is the young man, who with Robert Howie and Howard LaGrange, is charged with the burglary of the Milwaukee tool house near Fifteenth street. In the trial it was proved by the defense that there is no article known as brass journals, which the indictment charges the theft of, but that there are journal brasses and journal bearings. Judge Gest overruled a motion to instruct the jury for acquittal.

Divorces Granted.
Judge Gest this morning issued decrees of divorce in three cases. David Hillier was granted a decree in the case against his wife, Mrs. Eva Hillier on the ground of desertion. They were married Nov. 17, 1902. Mr. Hillier objected to certain men frequenting their home, and his wife left him Sept. 15, 1903. Mrs. Olive M. Gibson was granted a divorce from her husband, Henry Gibson, on a charge of desertion. Myrtle James was granted a divorce from William James, on the charge of extreme cruelty. They were married at Cedar Rapids.

New Cases Filed.

In a bill for divorce filed in the circuit court today, Mrs. Johanna Werner charges her husband, Wilhelm Werner, with extreme cruelty, and states that his acts of cruelty to her were of almost daily occurrence during their married life of 36 years. Their marriage took place Aug. 27, 1871. The complainant states that one occasion her husband kicked and struck her and drove her from the home, and that another time when she had been out for a short time in the evening, calling at a neighbor's residence, her husband locked the door and refused to allow her to enter, it being necessary for her to secure shelter at a neighbor's home. J. L. Hass is the solicitor for the complainant.

Valentine Canyet, in a divorce suit against her husband, Hypolite Canyet, charges her husband with adultery. They were married in Belgium May 28, 1901. The defendant came to the United States April 22, 1904, and took up his residence in Detroit, where his wife joined him Aug. 2, 1905. They lived together but two weeks. W. R. Moore represents the complainant.

Grand Rapids, Mich., March 8.—Judge Stuart in the superior court yesterday afternoon fined Harry Lewis, the Philadelphia prize fighter, \$1,000 for engaging in a prize fight; and Jacob Besterman, father of Lewis, \$1,000; and Frank O'Brien, Lewis' trainer, \$200 for aiding and abetting a prize fight. Except the pending case of Referee Eddie Ryan of Detroit, those fines close all actions growing out of the fight here between Harry Lewis and Mike Ward of Sarnia, Ont., Nov. 15 last, which resulted in the death of Ward.
