## WON BY FREEPORT

Local High School Team Loses Decision in Debate on Corporation Control.

### DEFENDED THE NEGATIVE SIDE

Norman French, Charles Larkin and Joseph Kelly Represent School—Are Given Reception.

Freeport, Ill., Feb. 22.—(Argus Special.)—Freeport high school won the decision in the inter-school debate with Rock Island high school last night on the subject, "Resolved, that the federal government should have control of the great corporations doing an interstate business, the constitutionality of such control being conceded."

Freeport debated in the affirmative, being represented by George Green, Alpheus Dresser and Oscar Enenga. The Rock Island team included Norman French, Charles Larkin and Joseph Kelly, who were accompanied here by T. M. Coen of the school faculty.

The judges were Dr. James A. James, head of the department of history in Northwestern University, Dr. M. M. Qualle of the University of Chicago, and Dr. H. B. Kennedy of Beloit college, Beloit, Wis.

### Are Given Reception.

Rock Island did good work, and the decision was a difficult one for the judges to make. A reception was tendered the Rock Island delegation by the Freeport high school literary societies at the close of the public meeting.

### Had Difficult Side.

Having the unpopular and more difficult side of the question, the Rock Island boys were not expected to secure a decision from the strong Freeport team. They upheld their contentions creditably, however.

Wilson Bering, schedule maker of the Three-Eye league, has finished his work, and copies are expected to be sent to the several clubs next week. Mr. Bering was waiting upon the settling of the dates of the Western Trotting association so as to avoid all conflicts. It is said the changes in last year's program will be few. There will be 140 games, and the season will start April 30 and close Sept. 13. There will be usual arrangement of holiday games, and all clubs will play every day in the season.

## TEAMS OF STATE ARE TO CONTEST

Baseball Championship Meet of Illinois High School Athletic Association Arranged.

Formal announcement was made today by Principal H. E. Brown of the local high school, secretary and treasurer of the Illinois High School Athletic association, of the completion of arrangements for a basketball tournament along the line suggested recently, and heretofore referred to in The Argus. The tournament is to decide the championship of the association, and will be held at Oak Park March 27 and 28. Schools registered in the association are eligible to compete, and Rock Island will send a team to the tournament.

The preliminaries will be held the afternoon and evening of March 27 and the morning and afternoon of March 28, at the Oak Park Y. M. C. A. gymnasium. If the entries are so numerous that the preliminaries cannot all be held at the time, arrangements will be made to hold some of the preliminary contests earlier on neutral floors. The finals will be held the evening of March 28.

The contest will be in charge of Athletic Director Tapp of the Oak Park Y. M. C. A., and he will name the officials to act at the games. The entries must be in the hands of Lewis Omer of Oak Park by March 14. Suitable trophies will be provided.

## GETS THE VERDICT

Packey McFarland Wins Well Earned Decision From Fred Welsh, the Englishman,

### THOUGH BOUT GOES THE LIMIT

Attempt to Land a Knockout Fails—Stanley Ketchell Picked to Defeat Mike Sullivan.

Milwaukee, Feb. 22.—Packey McFarland of Chicago showed whirlwind action against Freddie Welsh of England last night in the 10-round battle before the Badger Athletic club, winning the decision after a terrific bout. The pride of the stock yards administered a fearful beating to the speedy Briton, although he fell down in attempt to win a bet of \$200 to \$100 that he would stop Welsh inside of the limit.

It was the old story of a lightning fast boxer against a scienceless slugger in which the latter won out. Referee Valachy Hogan's decision was received with favor, although a small number of the 1,500 present shouted the verdict.

Welsh showed indomitable courage and stood the gaff at all times, never flinching for an instant, although he frequently adopted a crouch that worried the little Chicago champion.

### The Preliminaries.

In the first preliminary Fred Nehr knocked out "Sailor" Thompson in the second round. In the second preliminary Eddie Greenwald in a six round bout earned the decision over Marty Kane in easy fashion.

The eight round semi-windup between Steve Kinney of Milwaukee and Eddie Kenny of Chicago was awarded to Kinney after a tame contest.

### Ketchell Picked as Victor.

San Francisco, Cal., Feb. 22.—The supporters of Stanley Ketchell, who is dated to meet Mike (Twin) Sullivan of Boston in a 25-round bout at Colma this afternoon, are forced to give odds of 2 to 1 on their man and there are few wagers of any size recorded. Sullivan's friends appear to have little confidence in the Boston man against Ketchell and most of the Ketchell money is going begging.

### CHARTERS ARE IN DANGER

Corporations Will Forfeit if They Fail to Send in Reports.

Springfield, Ill., Feb. 22.—Six thousand Illinois corporations are in danger of losing their charters for failure to file reports as provided by law. Under the law, corporations are required to make two reports annually to the secretary of state: one, the so-called anti-trust affidavit, in the month of September, the other the annual report as to officers and business, between the first day of February and the first day of March. Over 6,000 corporations are still delinquent in the making of the February report. The penalty for failure to report within the time required by law is forfeiture of charter, with a provision that reinstatement may be had within one year, on the payment of a penalty of \$20.

### INSURANCE BAR IS PUT UP

Metropolitan, Equitable, and Prudential Kept from Missouri.

Jefferson City, Mo., Feb. 22.—Superintendent Vandiver of the state insurance department announced yesterday that when the licenses of the Metropolitan, Equitable, and Prudential Life Insurance companies expire, March 1, he will refuse to grant licenses for the next year, because of the act passed by the last legislature prohibiting the licensing of any company which pays officers salaries of over \$50,000 a year.

### EXPULSION FOLLOWS HAZING

Faculty of Hedding College Ousts Three Students and Suspends Two.

Galesburg, Ill., Feb. 22.—The faculty of Hedding college, at Abingdon, has expelled three students, Ben Thurman, Morris Robinson and Lloyd McLeish, suspended two others and reprimanded two young men and five young women. The action followed the hazing of Clarence Robinson, who was tied to a tree during the blizzard and almost perished. Another breach of discipline was the holding of a dance, which President MacVey, in an address to the students, said was a violation of the rules of the institution.

Dubuque for 90 Cent Gas.

Dubuque, Iowa, Feb. 22.—At a late hour Thursday night the city council passed an ordinance providing for 90 cent gas. The present rate is \$1. The mayor refused to state whether he will sign the ordinance.

Papa of 14 Weds Marry of 8.

Sterling, Ill., Feb. 22.—William Evans of Kasbeer, Bureau county, wedded his third wife yesterday. He is the father of 14 children and she the mother of eight. Their ages are 60 and 68, respectively.

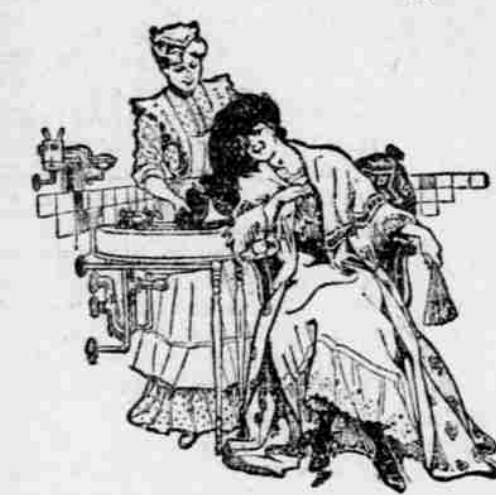
