VETERAN OF RING

George Siler, Noted Referee and Authority on Pugilism, Passes Away.

HEART FAILURE THE CAUSE

Once a Leading Lightweight Boxer-Officiated in Many Famous Battles in His Time.

Chicago, June 15 .- George Siler, the veteran referee and one of the best known authorities on boxing in the country, died Saturday night at 10:30 o'clock at his home, 786 Forty-sixth street, from an attack of the heart. The original ailment struck the veteran as he was walking on Madison

street, ready to depart to witness the Ketchel-Papke battle at Milwaukee. The most heroic measures were used to prolong his life, which were successful for the time being.

Mr. Siler was 63 years old and early in his career was one of the best known lightweight boxers in the country. He had been connected with literary work for nearly 40 years, having handled a column on fistic lore even when he was actively engaged as referee. His work as third man in the ring soon brought him to the front, and he was generally recognized as one of the noted lights and authorities on the ring.
