

J. P. McGOORTY TO BE IN CITY THIS EVENING

Candidate for Democratic Gubernatorial Nomination to Great Friends.

WILL BE AT THE HARPER

After Spending Afternoon in Moline Chicago Legislator Comes to Rock Island.

Hon. John P. McGoorty of Chicago, candidate for the democratic gubernatorial nomination, arrived in Moline this morning and is spending the afternoon there and at Campbell's island. At 6 o'clock this evening he comes to Rock Island and will spend the evening at the Harper house, where he is anxious to meet Rock Island democrats and citizens generally. The reception tendered McGoorty will be entirely informal and all are welcome to meet him. Chairman W. C. Maucker of the democratic county committee extends an invitation to all democrats and others to call on Mr. McGoorty during the evening.

Is a Prominent Illinoisian. Mr. McGoorty is one of the leading men of Illinois. He has served many years in the legislature, having been part of the time minority leader on the floor of the house and has always taken a conspicuous position in the legislation of the state. He is a brilliant speaker, a genial, straightforward citizen and a man whom it is a pleasure to know.

The next governor of this state is going to be a democrat and the three formally announced candidates in the field, J. P. McGoorty, Douglas Pattison and J. Hamilton Lewis, are making an energetic campaign in the state for the nomination, but their plan of campaign is quite in contrast with that with which Governor C. S. Deen and ex-Governor Dick Yates are offing the people. There is no mud-slinging and no personalities among the democratic candidates. Each recognizes in the others the elements of fitness that make a representative candidate. So that while each is earnestly seeking to win, he is not doing it to the disparagement of his rival.

Plated Tin Spoons. Here is one way of making spoons, the process described being used in the manufacture of one variety of tin plated spoons.

In its original form the material from which these spoons are made comes in long thin strips of steel rolled to a uniform thickness. The strips are twelve or fifteen feet in length and of a width sufficient for the length of the spoon to be made. These strips are fed into a cutting machine, which cuts off pieces, each of sufficient size for making a spoon, these being simply so many small, flat pieces of sheet steel.

Then these blanks are put through a grader, a machine with powerful rolls, which so works the metal as to make it thinner in those parts of the blank that are to form the bowl and the handle of the spoon and thicker in the middle of the length of the blank from which the shank of the spoon will be made, so that it will be the better able to bear the bending strain that will be put upon the spoon in use.

From the grader the blank goes into a drop press, which cuts it into the outline form of a spoon, though from this press it comes out still flat.

Then in another press the bowl of the spoon is formed, and then in still another the handle, and so at last you have the spoon in its complete spoon shape in steel, ready now to be plated by dipping it in molten tin.

SECRET SERVICE MAN VISITS CITY

Comes to Look Up Counterfeit Coins and Instruct Bank Clerks in Detecting Them.

Peter J. Drautzberg, one of five secret service men sent out by the government recently in connection with wholesale counterfeiting cases over the country, was in Rock Island and Moline today. He visited the banks and collected such spurious coins as have been collected and instructed the money handlers how to find the most common defects in the "querc." Mr. Drautzberg says the most common counterfeit at the present time is one of the silver dollar.

REFEREE NAMES MAYOR AS RECEIVER

Olsen is Given Charge of Stock of the Bankrupt Moline Famous Clothing Company.

Adair Pleasants of this city, referee in bankruptcy, has appointed Mayor Andrew Olson of Moline as receiver of the Moline Famous Clothing company. The company's store was closed about two weeks ago by proceedings on a chattel mortgage, and creditors later took the matter into the federal court at Peoria. The liabilities are estimated at \$15,000, and the assets at between \$10,000 and \$12,000. Mayor Olson will probably make an effort to dispose of some of the stock, and will act until the creditors elect a trustee.

NEIGHBORS IN A QUARREL

Differences of Port Byron Residents in a Justice Court.

John P. Smith of Port Byron was tried today in Justice J. H. Cleland's court on the charge of assault with a deadly weapon. Mrs. Mary Keely also of Port Byron, was the complainant. It seems that the two are neighbors and the trouble resulted from Mrs. Keely tying her cow to the fence which separates the two homes. Smith objected strenuously and attempted to cut the rope and free the cow and in doing so his knife came in contact with Mrs. Keely's hands, cutting them somewhat. Justice Cleland bound Smith over to the grand jury under bonds of \$200.

Bell Smetison, appeared before Justice G. A. Johnson and answered to a charge of disorderly conduct preferred against her by Amanda Simmons.

Railroad Signal Horns.

The Prussian state railroads are experimenting with signal horns, with which guards are to repeat brake signals given by the engine men, which are heard by all the guards, especially in stormy weather, when they have their collars turned up. It is also proposed to ascertain whether these horns may not be used to advantage when trains break in two. One management which has used the horns for repeating starting signals reports that they can be heard for great distances, even against the wind.

A Salvation Army Fleet. General Booth's latest project is to establish a fleet of Salvation Army steamers to carry the army's emigrants across the Atlantic.

TO ALLOT FUNDS

Council Will Consider the Annual Appropriations at an Adjourned Meeting.

IS AN IMPORTANT PROBLEM

Ordinance Should Provide for Annexed Territory, and for Improved Fire Protection.

The city council Monday evening will hold an adjourned session, when one of the most important matters of the year will be up for consideration. The council at this time will consider the annual appropriation ordinance, and the allotment of the various funds has been the subject of much consideration by the individual aldermen, and has kept Mayor Schaffner and City Clerk Rodgers busy for several weeks. Mr. Rodgers has completed the report of the estimated revenues for the year, on which the appropriations are based, and this will be presented Monday evening.

In New Territory.

There are several matters that the council is expected to make provision for in the ordinance and the resolution accompanying it. That paying and sewer improvements will have a large part in the distribution of the funds is a certainty. It is also expected that money will be set aside for at least preliminary work in the territory in South Rock Island recently annexed to the city. While South Rock Island township is partially responsible for the conditions there, even since annexation, the city will shoulder the burden, and it is thought that the first steps will be taken in the appropriations for this year.

New Hose House.

The residents of the Sixth and Seventh wards are deeply interested in the allotment of funds, because of the fact that in both wards big sewer and drainage systems have been projected and the preliminaries are under way, and also because of the need of provision for better fire protection in the eastern part of the city. For several years plans have been under consideration for adding a new fire department company on the hill in the Seventh ward, and returning the No. 3 company to its old quarters on Twenty-sixth street near Seventh avenue. A new hose house on Twelfth street near Twelfth avenue has also been proposed, as a means of providing better protection for the newer residence district of the city.

The extension of the police and fire alarm systems is also expected to receive consideration.

DUMMY SOLDIER TO TEST NEW BELT

Novel Experiment is Being Conducted at Rock Island Arsenal With a Mechanical Man.

A novel experiment is being conducted at the Rock Island arsenal which is attracting considerable attention throughout the country especially in military circles. It is nothing less than a dummy soldier which goes through the motions of a man walking. Around the waist of the dummy is a new cartridge belt and the test is to determine the strength of the belt. The belt is filled with the regular number of cartridges and it makes quite a load for the poor dummy. The new pointed bullets are causing the experiment as the government wishes to find what effect they will have upon the life of the belts. The dummy is walking at the rate of 100,000 steps a day and at that rate it will not take long to make the trial.
