USES GOOD TRICK

W. A. Strayer Wins Slow Race in Launch Happy Hours by Clever Placing of Weight

FOR ISLAND CITY TITLE

Throws Propeller Out of Water, and Beats Mississippi River Champion, the Iona.

A big surprise was sprung last evening in the slow race given by the Island City Boat club as neither of the two boats which were expected to come in first and second even finished the race. W. A. Strayer out-generaled the others and won the race easily, in his boat, the Happy Hours.

Each contestant had the right to place the appointed judge who accompanied his boat, at any part of the boat he saw fit and Strayer placed his judge as far forward as possible, and after starting his engine went forward himself, raising the rear end of the boat half out of water and uncovering the propeller. This made the propeller churn the water and the speed of the boat in this condition was almost nothing. Even at that it was a close race between the Happy Hours, the Black Hawk, owned by H. W. Bennett, and the Iona, owned by Commodore Carsons.

Both Engines Stop. They kept neck and neck for the first quarter of the distance, but suddenly the engine of the Black Hawk stopped and it was out of the race.

The Iona was the next boat to be disqualified. The commodore was busy watching some friend who was calling his attention from the shore when his engine stopped chugging and the boat was out of the race. That left it easy for the Happy Hours, the engine of which was running so fast that there was little danger of its stopping. By the time it had reached the upper end of the course the other boats entered in the race had completed the course and so it was enabled to come down the river at full speed and still win the race. There was some question as to whether it had qualified as when it had started out it had proved a pretty hard proposition to steer it on account of the tunder being nearly out of the water. It had swerved a little out of its course, but the judges decided that it had not lost enough distance to put it out of the running. Accordingly it was adjudged the winner. The Semi-nole, owned by Joe Ely, was second and the Maybe, owned by Charles Strate, was third. Neither of these boats were expected to figure in the race, but the disqualifying of the other boats made them winners of places. W. H. Gest's boat, the Viro, and the Fox, owned by George Guthormson, finished the race and were in but a few seconds before the second and third place boats. There were eight entries in the race.

When the starters for the rowboat race were called for, none responded, and it was decided to call the race off, to the disappointment of the spectators who lined the bank. It is thought that the opening of the race to any one is what cut off the entries, for there are several who said that had the contestants been limited to the club members they would have entered the race. This race will probably be cut out in the future, as there seems to be little interest in rowing.

Regatta Labor Day

At the club meeting which followed the slow race the report of the different excursion committees were submitted and approved by the club. It was found that the club had realized a handsome sum, and most of it was at once voted to apply on the debt of the club.

An expression of the members as to the best time to hold some more races was taken, and the club seemed to favor the idea of having a small regatta on Labor day. This suggestion will be given to the race committee to act upon. If it is favorable to the committee, it is likely that the race for the loving cup, donated to the club by Jacob Ramser, will be raced for by the boats of the three cities. This is to be a handicap race, and the committee is at present preparing a set of rules, taking into consideration the power, length and beam of the boats. This system of handicapping the boats will prove much more satisfactory than the trial speed system with 5 per cent increase in speed.
