Dr. W. S. Marquis Tomorrow
Will Celebrate Anniversary
at Broadway Church.

APPEAL FOR "MERCY SUNDAY" MADE TO MINISTERS OF THE THREE CITIES

In accordance with an appeal sent out by President William O. Stillman of the National Humane society of Rock Island and Scott county Humane societies are preparing to have "mercy Sunday" exercises in the churches of Rock Island, Moline and Davenport at an early date. The appeal from national headquarters follows:

To the Clergy—We appeal to you to exercise an active interest in the protection of dumb animals against cruelty, and to preach a sermon, in your respective churches—at least one each year—on the subject of humane education.

In every community there are many instances of cruelty constantly occurring which are often but the result of thoughtlessness, indifference and ignorance in the offenders, due to the fact that their attention has never been called to their obligation to these dumb friends and companions.

It is generally understood that hordes of animals passing between the

ports of all nations die, or have to be destroyed, in transit, on account of cruelty or carelessness. And the same may be said, doubtless, of cattle in transit from our western plains to eastern markets and it is still said that notwithstanding the effort made to prevent the western cattle kings of this country leaving our herds to winter on the plains without providing food or shelter for them and with heartlessness, deliberately figure out how large a number they can afford to lose by starvation and exposure.

And again hundreds of dumb animals are annually sacrificed, uselessly we claim, in the cause of vivisection.

Equally shocking is the thoughtless and unnecessary maiming and killing of song and other birds.

There are many other forms of cruelty, the terrible details of which are from time to time laid before us.

We appeal to you, who have consecrated your lives to the teachings of kindness, mercy, love and obedience to conscience, to help in the humane efforts of the society by addressing your congregation and Sunday schools upon this many sided subject with a view of causing them to be more kind and thoughtful in their daily life.

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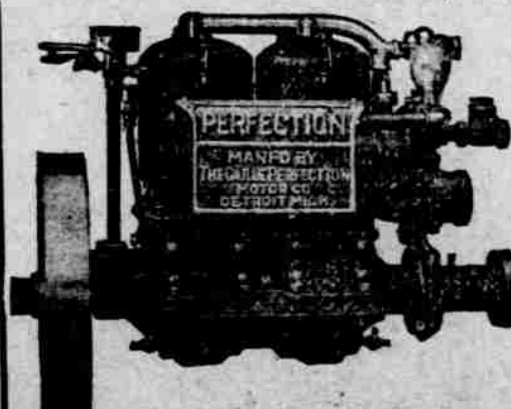
