## NEW RECORD AT SEATTLE

Ralph Rose Outdoes Former Shotput  
Mark Making 50.26 Feet.  
Seattle, Aug. 16.—The annual senior championship meet of the Amateur Athletic association union held in the exposition stadium Saturday afternoon, brought to the front a little Indian from Arizona, who defeated the pick of the country's five mile runners. Seattle carried off the first honors in

the meet, San Francisco second and Chicago third.  
One of the sensations was the establishment of a new world's record in the 16 pound shot-put by Ralph Rose of San Francisco. Already the holder of the title for this event, his previous record being 49 feet 10 inches, made in New York in 1908, Saturday he hurled the iron ball 50.26. Rose also secured 21 points to his own credit, the greatest number secured by any athlete.
