

AS A LESSON TO OTHER YOUNG MEN

Otis Hines to Push Daughter's Breach of Promise Suit Against R. H. Schmidt.

NOT HIS FIRST OFFENSE

Charged That He Disappointed Girl Who Nursed Him Through Siege of Typhoid Fever.

Otis Hines, father of Miss Mable Hines, plaintiff in a suit for \$5,000 damages against Robert H. Schmidt for alleged breach of promise, says he proposes making an example of the defendant as a lesson to those young men who make a practice of toying with the affections of young women. "My daughter is not the first girl whom Mr. Schmidt has been engaged to and disappointed," Mr. Hines said today at his home, 1016 Sixteenth avenue. "We will show that he had promised to marry another girl who nursed him through a siege of typhoid fever. She had gone ahead with arrangements for the wedding, and had brought all her clothes, when suddenly, in the case of Mable, he changed his mind."

Family Believed in Him. "We knew of this affair, but he protested his sincerity in his courtship of Mable, and we believed in him. He presented Mable with a ring to bind the engagement, and they planned a new home together. He bought a lot at Eleventh street and Eleventh avenue and the house is almost completed. It would have been ready for them by Oct. 6, the date they had set for their wedding."

"Last week my daughter gave up her position in the office of the Singer Sewing Machine company, on Twelfth street, in order to devote herself to the details of what was to be the happiest event in her life. You can imagine the crushing blow it was to the girl when Schmidt told her in the midst of her planning that he had decided not to get married just yet."

Transfer Property. "And to add to the humiliation of my daughter the night that he asked for the return of the engagement ring he took another girl to a dancing party at the Watch Tower. He then decided over the property that was intended as a home for him and Mable to his mother. We propose to fight the case out and make him pay for the suffering and humiliation he has brought to my daughter."

PASTORATE ENDED

Rev. W. B. Clemmer Reviews Work of Three Years at Head of Congregation.

173 MEMBERS RECEIVED

Retiring Minister to Devote His Future Efforts to Work in Evangelistic Field.

"That Ye May Have Life and Have It Abundantly" was the theme of Rev. W. B. Clemmer's farewell address yesterday morning to the congregation of the Memorial Christian church, the pastorate of which he has resigned to enter the evangelistic field.

Rev. Clemmer spoke of his call to the church in 1906 and said: "I

was with a tender feeling for the people and the surroundings that I accepted this call when it was extended to me. I came with joy and I go with joy, because God is leading me, and will bless my work wherever I may go. I know that my work here has not been greatly successful and popular, but from the expressions and letters of gratitude which I have received I know that some poor soul has been benefited by my ministrations."

A summary of the work accomplished by Mr. Clemmer and the church during his service was read to the people. The figures presented show that there has been a healthy increase in membership and offerings. The pastor officiated at 43 weddings, conducted 52 funerals and preached 343 sermons. There were 173 members received into the church and 80 withdrew from the church, making an increase of 93. Besides these figures, Rev. Clemmer presented a list of the donations made since 1906.

Mission at East Moline. A brief summary of the other work accomplished is as follows: A preaching mission has been established at East Moline, a teachers' training class formed, a church directory published, a weekly calendar issued, a men's club organized, an arch of electric lights placed over the main entrance. The church was permanently wired for the stereopticon. An active part was taken by the pastor in the local option campaign and in the Sunday School Workers' union.

At the conclusion of this report, Rev. Clemmer said:

"We make this outline summary in no spirit of vain boasting. No one knows the limitations of our labors better than we. It has required work. We have sought to be diligent and faithful. Our hearts' best gratitude is herewith expressed to everyone of that loyal company who have made the work possible and who have consistently held up our hands in hope and prayer. We lay this service humbly at His feet."
