SEVENTH GAME WITHOUT BREAK

Danville, After Dropping Series to Islanders, Is on Its Way.

CAVET IS TOE STUMBLER

Visitors Never Have a Chance, But Pug Leosens Twice and Allows Them to See Plate.

The champions hung up their seventh straight victory yesterday afternoon at the expense of Danville, the score being 7 to 3. After the very first inning it was apparent that it was going to be the Islanders' game, as they showed at the start that they were on the job and were out to win, while the curves and shoots of Pitcher Benz had no terrors for them.

Cavet did the slab work for the champs and while his work was not chip-diced, it was more because he did not have to exert himself than that the visitors were making it hot for him. He just sort of amped along, retiring the side in all but two innings without them getting any men across the plate. They scored one man in the initial round almost before Pug was on the job, but after that they were helpless until he let up in the eighth and allowed them to get two more men over the rubber just to make the Danville rooters think that their team was still in the running.

One Hit Brings Score.

Pug opened up by throwing four wide ones to Madigan, the first man up in the first inning, and Magee dumped one down that pushed Madigan to second. Fisher followed with a line drive over second, on which Madigan scored, the throw in from center being a second too late and a yard too wide. Fisher went to second on the throw and reached third when Burns grounded to Slattery, but that ended the run-getting until the eighth. In that session Pug became generous again and issued a walk to Fisher, who led off. Burns hit for one base, driving Fisher to third and, after Slattery and Sullivan had each succumbed to Cavet's twisters, Hildebrand straightened one out that brought two runs over the pan. It was a vain effort, however, as the Islanders were so far in the lead that there was little chance of ever getting within sight of them, and the scores merely made the champs feel more like playing. In the last round all three men were retired in order and there were no more chances for the tail-enders to make trouble for Pug.

How Islanders Scored.

After seeing the visitors take the lead in the first half of the opening inning the Islanders came right back and more than got even. Three men were rushed over the pan before the third one was put out. Hunter and Manusch had both succumbed when the music was started by Callahan, who worked Benz for four wide ones. Stark drove a hot one to Humphries on third and was credited with a hit when the ball took a bad hop just as it reached the fielder and escaped his grasp. The play put Callahan on third, as he had previously stolen second, and after Stark had pulled off a neat steal of the middle cushion, Slattery banged one on the nose and sent the ball scooting out into right field. Callahan and Stark both scored on the drive. Slats stole second and reached third on Fisher's bungle of Kelly's drive. Kell started to steal and drew a throw which Magee dropped, and Slats crossed the pan with the third score of the inning.

Three Hits in Fourth.

Two men were down again in the fourth inning when the music of safe singles commenced and resulted in the fourth of the champions' scores. Kohl smashed out a two-sacker and Vogel followed with a safe drive into left. Cavet followed with a duplicate of Otto's drive and Kohl reached home nicely.

In the seventh an error and four safeties in a row counted four more tallies for the Islanders. Cavet reached first by grace of Fisher and then Hunter, Manusch, Callahan and Stark hit in succession and four men scored. All the hits except that of Manusch were singles, the drive Manusch sent out being for two sacks. That ended the scoring and the Islanders had plenty to win. The box score:

Son of Chicago Alderman Succeeds Speaker Cannon as Sponsor for It.

MAY BE SOME CHANGES

Stated, However, That McCarthy Will Still Be Manager—May Be a Chance for Decatur.

The first sign of a break at Danville came today when the sale of the club by the original owners to John Powers, son of Alderman Powers of Chicago, was effected. The announcement came in an Associated Press dispatch to the Argus. It was stated that Manager McCarthy would continue in charge.

The team has been in the hands of members of the 100,000 club, which organization had virtually stood sponsor for it. Speaker Joe Cannon is understood to have been interested.

Powers is a young business man of Danville. The price he paid is \$4,346, the amount of the outstanding indebtedness.

The former directors spent about \$18,000 and took in from subscriptions and in other ways. In addition to admissions, something over \$14,000. Powers married a daughter of the late Michael Kelly, the Illinois coal baron, and has erected a beautiful home in Danville.

Owners Fall Out.
For some time there has been evidence of a serious disagreement among the leading backers of the team, due to the long series of losses, and receipts have not been sufficient to pay expenses. Today's transaction indicates that a reorganization of the team is likely to take place. Should this not prove effective there are many wise ones about the Three-Eye who would not be surprised to see the franchise transferred back to Decatur which has virtually repudiated Northern association baseball, though the team is still playing under the city's name.
