Carney brought Custer along from the coast. He is an old head who knows the game and how to handle pitchers.

## TIED UP IN ITS OWN RED TAPE

National Baseball Commission in Peculiar Position in Case of Quincy.

A DECISION IS WITHHELD

Three-Eye Status in Doubt Several Days Longer Pending Conference of Big Leaguers.

No action will be taken by the National commission as to reopening the Three-Eye circuit case, it was given out by Chairman Herrmann at Cincinnati yesterday, after there is a meeting of his associates. This is not expected to take place before next week, as President Ban Johnson of the American league is now at Excelsior Springs, Mo., for a rest, and will at least remain over Sunday. There will be no schedule meeting till a decision is made.

It appears that the strongest point that President Harry Hofer of Quincy has in which to ask that his city be given a place in the league is the promise of national commission members themselves that the Gem city would be taken care of. This promise seems to have been made before the commission members had looked very far into the case, and was ill-advised, to say the least. It looks as though the baseball court is as much concerned with its own position as it is with the future of the Three-Eye league, and this accounts for some of the peculiar angles of the decisions it has already given. If it should now see fit to reverse itself its prestige would be bound to suffer still further. In fact, the commission would have been in a much better condition had it kept out of this case altogether.

**MAKING BAD MATTER WORSE.**  
If the question were one over which the commission had admitted jurisdiction and a reversal of verdict were made it would be bad enough, but after it has been confessed that authority is lacking for the alteration of contracts between members of a league it is almost inconceivable that any attempt to find relief for Quincy by adding it to this league should be made.

### DEFENDERS FOR PEORIA

Fast Boats Entered in Western Association Regatta.  
Peoria, Ill., April 7.—J. Stuart Blackton of New York, an official of the Motor Boat Club of America, has agreed to bring two defenders to the Western association regatta. W. F. Harris of Newark, N. J., followed suit and yesterday Chairman Thomas H. Webb received the entries of the new Dixie III, owned by Frederick K. Burnham, present holder of the American trophy, and that of Albert E. Smith of New York, who is having built a \$55,000 hydroplane to defend the cup. Both of these men are officials of the Motor Boat Club of America.  
Three western aspirants for international honors have already entered these races, giving Peoria the greatest meeting ever held in the western hemisphere.  
Two weeks ago eastern yachting men of national reputation who are now building boats to defend the American cup agreed to make Peoria

the tryout city if the dates for the third annual regatta of the Western association could be arranged so as not to conflict with the St. Lawrence river dates. Monday evening the directors of the Illinois Valley Yacht club, under whose auspices this regatta will be run, changed the dates from Aug. 8 and 9 to July 25 and 26.
