

MUCH INTEREST IS SHOWN TODAY

Excitement Is Intense as Baseball Fans Watch Returns at Argus Bulletin.

SERIES REACH A CRISIS

A win by Philadelphia would settle the championship and a victory for the Giants would put them on equal footing with the Athletics. Partisan feeling was strong and there was more betting than usual.

HAIR-SPLITTING TACTICS OF LAWYERS WILL MAKE McNAMARA TRIAL LONG ONE

The care which Judge Walter Bordwell takes to keep clear the record of the McNamara trial at Los Angeles—the exhaustive arguments he permits upon every mooted point—promise to stretch out the hearing to interminable weeks and months. Gilmore pointed out that George Memsie, who was recently defeated by Eddie Murphy at Gary, spent considerable money in training, lost a \$250 weight forfeit and was given the short end of a \$600 house for his trouble and a beating. Gilmore said that Memsie lost close to \$200 on the mill.

Marlowe of New York, who as a lad several years ago gave up to the elderly woman his berth in a sleeping car on a New York to Washington train.
