


Daily United States Weather Map

Louis C. Scholl, bronze medal and \$1,000, as needed. Scholl, carpenter, saved Raymond C. Lanfear, clerk, from drowning, Santa Cruz, Cal., July 9, 1911.

Clarence Van Nostrand, bronze medal and \$1,000, as needed. Van Nostrand, aged 16, attempted to save T. Waverly Doney, and saved Florence T. Doney and Frank Halvorsen, children, from drowning, Gen. Cove, N. Y., Jan. 8, 1911.

John McBride, bronze medal and \$1,000, as needed. McBride, laborer, saved Cyrus L. Nall from drowning, Tarpos, Texas, March 9, 1910.
