"TUBBY" HACKETT HANDED RELEASE

Quincy Manager Is Out Adrift—Second Baseman Kahl to Succeed Him.

"Tubby" Hackett, the genial and round baby who had been directing the destinies of the Quincy cellar aggregation, has been handed his unconditional release, and Second Baseman Nick Kahl has been shoved up into the manager notch. Hackett was lashed by the Quincy club last fall after Bade Myers had given up the team. He was a member of the catching staff last year, but owing to an attack of rheumatism, was unable to do much work. At the end of the season he journeyed to California in the hopes that he might locate his lost condition, but there was nothing doing. When he arrived at Quincy this season he had several pounds of excess beef, and has been unable to trim down to fighting shape. His throwing arm also went to the bad. The Quincy directors believe that a playing manager will be more effective, and hence the change.

Kahl, the new manager, is a veteran, having started in professional baseball in 1902 with the Kansas City club. Since that time he has played with Grand Rapids, Lyman, Colorado Springs, Cleveland and several other clubs. In 1905 he was a member of the Naps as utility infielder, rubbing for Lajoie in a number of games. At the end of the season he was released and has since been playing minor league ball. For the last two years he has played third base, but this year went to second. While Hackett was under suspension, the team was in charge of Nick, and he handled the players in excellent style—Quincy Journal.
