DOMESTIC SCIENCE DEPARTMENT. Home-made Sugar Cookies MILK CREAM OF RICE SOUP. Materials—Rice, one half cup; stalks of celery, two, or celery seed, one salt-spoonful; milk, one pint; veal or chicken stock, one pint; salt, one teaspoonful; butter, two tablespoonfuls; good-sized onion; bay leaf, one; pepper, one; asparagus tips. Directions—Wash the rice thoroughly, throw it into a quart of boiling water, boil rapidly for ten minutes. Put it into the double boiler with the milk and stock. Cover and cook slowly for thirty minutes. While this is cooking cut the onion into slices; cook it carefully with half the butter in the spider. The onion must be perfectly tender; add the celery and bay leaf. When the rice is tender press it through a colander, add the mixture from the spider, return it to the double boiler, add the remaining tablespoonful of butter, salt and pepper. Press through a fine sieve and serve at once.

BREAKFAST. Fresh Seasonable Fruit (noticed) Puffed Wheat Whole Wheat Muffins and Butter Cocoa LAMB STEW WITH CARROTS, ONIONS and POTATOES. Lettuce and Cold Slaw Prune Puff The cabbage should be shaved very fine and seasoned with a little sugar, salt and very little oil and lemon juice or lemon juice and thick sour cream.

PRUNE PUFF. Materials—White of eggs, three; powdered sugar, one-quarter cup; cooked prunes, one cup; lemon juice, one tablespoonful. Directions—Whip the eggs to a stiff froth and slowly add the sugar, whipping all the time. Then add the cooked and the lemon juice and beat until very light. Put into a small buttered pudding dish, stand in a pan of hot water and bake in a moderately quick oven about fifteen minutes. Cool and serve with a soft cooked custard made from the yolks of the eggs. Other fruits may be used in place of prunes for a change.

SUPPER. Cream of Rice Soup Whole Wheat Bread and Butter

HOME-MADE SUGAR COOKIES. Material—Butter, one cup; sugar, one and one-half cups; water, one-half cup; the juice of one lemon; eggs, two; baking powder, two teaspoonfuls; rind of lemon, grated; flour. Directions—Squeeze the lemon juice into a cup and put in sufficient water to make the cup half full. Cream the butter and sugar, add the beaten eggs, mix well, add the water and other ingredients. Mix with flour as soft as can be rolled, sprinkle with sugar, cut and bake in a quick oven. A raisin, nut or cherry may be put in the center of each cookie.
