CEREMONY SET FOR 25TH

East Room of White House Chosen for the Service—Display of Gifts Barred.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 5.—President and Mrs. Wilson gave out from the White house last night the first official announcement of the wedding plans of their daughter, Miss Jessie Woodrow Wilson, and Francis Bowes Sayre.

The east room, where most of the previous White house weddings have taken place, has been chosen for the scene of the ceremony, which will take place at 4:30 p. m. on Tuesday, Nov. 25.

Miss Margaret Woodrow Wilson will act as her sister's maid of honor, and Miss Eleanor Randolph Wilson, youngest of the president's three daughters, will be one of the bridesmaids.

BRIDESMAIDS ARE ANNOUNCED.

The three other bridesmaids will be Miss Adeline Mitchell Scott, daughter of Prof. William B. Scott of Princeton; Miss Marjorie Brown, daughter of Mrs. Wilson's cousin, Col. E. T. Brown, of Atlanta, Ga., and Miss Mary G. White of Baltimore, a college friend of Miss Jessie Wilson.

The announcement that Dr. Wilfred T. Grenfell, with whom Mr. Sayre did mission work in Labrador, will be the best man, caused no surprise, as the future bridegroom had apprised his friends of that fact some time ago.

Three times a day we have bread or rolls made with yeast for leavening.

Yet women and girls are afraid to try to make bread because they do not understand the yeast. At least this is what I am told many times a day.

All this can only be accomplished by constant repetition, finding out what is wrong and then trying again.

Material—Milk, one pint; butter, three tablespoonsfuls; yeast, one cake; salt, one teaspoonful.

Directions—Scald the milk and add the butter; when lukewarm add the compressed yeast dissolved in one-fourth cup of warm water and salt.


