HOKOFF TRAINS TO MEET CUTLER

Chicago, Ill., Jan. 16.—Paul Martinson, America's best trial-horse wrestler, is to be added to Bill Hokoff's training camp, if he cares to accept the position. Martinson's work in conditioning Gustav Fristensky and his showing against Charlie Cutler at the Coliseum Monday night have made a deep impression on Hokoff, and he has sent out to bring Martinson in as an aid.

Hokoff, who is an American of Bohemian parentage, realizes that his only hope of getting a match with Fristensky is by a win over Cutler and he will overlook nothing to fit himself. With Marvin Piestina already as one of his trainers, "Bill" is down to a hard training grind. Marvin has worked with Gotch, Mahmoud, Zbyseko and all of the heavyweights.

The newcomer, who is matched to meet Cutler at the Empire theatre Monday night, is a powerful grappler. In his early training he has displayed tremendous strength and a good knowledge of the catch-as-catch-can style. He knows the various holds and how to get them and Cutler will find a worthy opponent.

Cutler is plugging along hard with his group of helpers and shows no signs of worry. He says he will trick his man into falls.

THOMPSON AND PAPKE TO MEET IN DETROIT

Aurora, Ill., Jan. 16.—Cyclone Johnny Thompson and Billy Papke have been matched to fight ten rounds before the Beloit Athletic club. The bout will be staged next month. The two middleweights were to have fought near Aurora last fall, but the local promoters could not find a location. In their last bout, a 20-round affair in Australia, Thompson won the decision. Thompson and Papke have been bitter rivals ever since the Australian fight. The latter has always claimed that he was a sick man the afternoon he entered the Australian ring.

DAVENPORT YOUTH LEAVES HOSPITAL

Racine, Wis., Jan. 16.—Jack Racer, the welterweight fighter from Davenport, Iowa, who was rendered unconscious after being struck several low blows in a fight with Barney Richter, is out of danger. Racer was revived in the ring but later lapsed into a semi-conscious condition and was hurried to a hospital. It was at first believed he was seriously injured. After an examination physicians told him he could leave the hospital.

Cincinnati, O., Jan. 16.—That Cincinnatians are more than eager to have a Federal league club in this city was again demonstrated yesterday when Attorney Paul Connelley of a prominent legal firm announced he has sent President Gilmore of the Federals a letter to the effect that he represents 100 small stockholders who can raise \$100,000 to finance a club here and that several available sites for a park are at the disposal of these men. This statement follows closely on the statement of Rudolph Gries Wednesday that he and others have backing to the extent of \$250,000 to place a team here.
