MOLINE DIVIDED INTO DISTRICTS

Fire Alarms Will Now Be Handled With Highest Degree of Efficiency.

Starting for the first time yesterday new system of fire alarms in Moline was inaugurated and the entire city has been connected under the modernized system which has its center at the Central fire station. Work of changing from a two circuit to a seven circuit system, as provided by the new equipment purchased at a cost of \$1,285, has been finished by an expert from the factory of the Star Electric company of Binghamton, N. Y., and today an official test was conducted before final acceptance by the city. In different parts of the city 78 fire alarm boxes are located. The territory embraced in the new fire alarm circuit division of the city: No. 1.—Factory district, Third avenue from First to Fifteenth street. No. 2.—West of Fifteenth street from Third to Twelfth avenue. No. 3.—West of Fifteenth street

from Twelfth avenue south to city limits.

No. 4.—East of Fifteenth street from Twelfth avenue south to city limits. No. 5.—Fifteenth to Twenty-seventh street from Fifth to Twelfth avenue. No. 6.—Territory east of Twenty-seventh street from Fourth avenue to Mississippi river. No. 7.—From Fifteenth to Twenty-seventh street and north of Fifth avenue.

KNOCKED FROM WAGON BY A TRAIN, BUT LIVES

Richard Albrecht of Moline, living at 214 Fourth avenue, was injured when struck by a train in East Moline, at the Thirteenth street crossing. Albrecht was driving a delivery wagon for the Jung meat market and was crossing the tracks late at night when the train struck the wagon, hurling the youth into a ditch and injuring him, though not seriously. He was taken to the hospital, where it was found that he was suffering with a number of bruises.

Little Money Found on Body of Frank Anderson, Found in Boston Bay.
