Salmon Vol-au-vent. - Remove the crusts from a five-cent baker's loaf and cut out the center to leave a boxshaped case having walls one-half inch thick. Beat three eggs slightly and add six tablespoonfuls of milk. Season with salt. Dip the bread case in the mixture and turn frequently. Drain and fry in deep fat and drain on brown paper. Remove to a hot platter, fill with creamed salmon and surround

Baked Haddock with Stuffing-Clean a four-pound haddock, sprinkle with salt inside and out, stuff and sew. Mr. and Mrs. Will Rich last evening Cut five diagonal gashes on each side of the backbone and insert narrow strips of fat salt pork, having the gashes on each side come between the gashes on the other side.
