TWO FRIENDS.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Things Worth Knowing. If you are doubtful about your cream keeping sweet, heat it to almost boiling, put in tightly corked glass bottles and set on the ice to cool. In this way it will not sour nearly so soon.

When washing white stockings, whether of silk or thread, add a few drops of oxalic acid to the water. The acid will remove the stains caused by the boots and shoes which are only set when washed with ordinary soap and water.

Salt makes the very best of gaffers for sore throat. Chamomile gloves will remain softer after washing if the soap suds are not entirely rinsed out, but allowed to dry in the gloves.

The Table.

Salmon Vol-au-vent.—Remove the crusts from a five-cent baker's loaf and cut out the center to leave a box-shaped case having walls one-half inch thick. Beat three eggs slightly and add six tablespoonfuls of milk. Season with salt. Dip the bread case in the mixture and turn frequently. Drain and fry in deep fat and drain on brown paper. Remove to a hot platter, fill with creamed salmon and surround with heated and seasoned canned peas.

Baked Haddock with Stuffing.—Clean a four-pound haddock, sprinkle with salt inside and out, stuff and sew. Cut five diagonal gashes on each side of the backbone and insert narrow strips of fat salt pork, having the gashes on each side come between the gashes on the other side. Shape with skewers in form of a letter "S" and fasten the skewers with small twine. Place on greased fish-sheet in a dripping pan, sprinkle with salt and pepper, brush over with melted butter, dredge with flour and place around the fish small pieces of fat salt pork. Bake one hour in a hot oven, basting every

10 minutes. Serve with drawn butter or egg sauce. Fish Stuffing.—One-half cup of cracker crumbs, one-half cup of stale bread crumbs, one-quarter cup of melted butter, one-quarter teaspoonful of salt, one-eighth teaspoonful of pepper, few drops of onion juice, one-quarter cup of hot water. Mix the ingredients in the order given.

Vegetable Souffle.—One-quarter cup of butter, one-quarter cup of flour, one-third cup of cream, one-third cup of water in which the vegetables were cooked, one cup of cooked vegetables ribbed through a sieve—carrots, turnips or onions—yolks of three eggs, whites of three eggs, salt and pepper. Melt the butter, add the flour and pour on gradually the cream and water, add the vegetables, yolks of eggs beaten until thick and lemon-colored, and fold in the whites of eggs beaten until stiff; then add the seasonings. Turn in a buttered baking dish and bake in a slow oven.

Tapoca Custard Pudding.—Four cups of scalded milk, two-thirds cup of pearl tapioca, three eggs, one-half cup of sugar, one teaspoonful of salt, one tablespoonful of butter. Soak the tapioca one hour in cold water to cover, drain, add to the milk and cook in a double boiler 30 minutes; beat the eggs slightly, add the sugar and the salt, pour on gradually the hot mixture, turn into a buttered pudding dish, add the butter, bake 30 minutes in a slow oven.

Curried Eggs.—Four hard-boiled eggs, two tablespoonfuls of butter, one-half tablespoonful of finely chopped onion, two tablespoonfuls of flour, one teaspoonful of curry powder, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-eighth teaspoonful of paprika, one and one-third cups of scalded milk, one-half cup of cooked rice. Chop the whites of the eggs and add to the sauce made of butter, flour, the seasonings and milk; then add the rice, heat to the boiling point, fill pulp cases and sprinkle with the yolks of the eggs rubbed through a sieve.

Macaroni.—Three-quarters cup of macaroni, two quarts of boiling salted water, one-half onion, two cloves, one and one-half cups of tomato sauce, one-half cup of grated cheese, two tablespoonfuls of wine, one-half tablespoonful of butter. Cook the macaroni in boiling salted water with the butter and onion stuck with the cloves; drain, remove the onion, reheat in the tomato sauce, add the cheese and wine.
