HOSTESS 500 CLUB.


Mrs. A. N. McNeill was the hostess yesterday afternoon at her home, 627 Seventeenth street, to the 500 club of which she is a member.

THINGS WORTH KNOWING.

When tortoise-shell combs, pins and other objects of the same material become dull, clean them with a little olive oil or vaseline.

CREAMED SALT CODFISH.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

Hot Cross Buns—One cup of scalded milk, one-fourth cup of sugar, two tablespoonfuls of butter, one-half teaspoonful of salt, one-half yeast cake dissolved in one-fourth cup of lukewarm water, three-fourths teaspoonful of cinnamon, three cups of flour, one egg, one-fourth cup of raisins stoned and quartered, or one-fourth cup of currants.

When cutting hard-boiled eggs it is a good idea to dip the knife in cold water. They will cut more smoothly.

When removing cake baked in tin pans place a wet cloth over the inverted pan and the cake will drop out nicely, never sticking to the pan.

Creamed Salt Codfish—Pick the salt codfish in pieces (there should be three-fourths of a cup), and soak in lukewarm water, the time depending upon the hardness and saltiness of the fish.

Tomato Soup—One can of tomatoes, one pint of water, twelve pepper corns, bit of bay leaf, four cloves, two tablespoonfuls of sugar, one teaspoonful of salt, one-eighth teaspoonful of soda, two tablespoonfuls of butter, three tablespoonfuls of flour, one slice of onion.

Cook the tomatoes, water, pepper-corns, bay leaf, cloves, and sugar 20 minutes; strain, and add the salt and soda. Brown the butter and flour cooked together; bind, and strain into the tureen.
