GOOD ROADS DAY FOR MOLINE, TOO

Exercises to Be Held April 15, Set Aside by Governor to Agitate Subject.

DRAG CONTEST A FEATURE

Conditions Will Be Similar to Those in Rock Island. With Attractive Prize List.

Moline is to have a good roads day program on state good roads day April 15. It was announced today. Like the one in Rock Island yesterday it will be held under the auspices of the Rock Island County Highway Improvement association. A drag contest will be held.

A. E. Nissen, who had charge of the contest in Rock Island, says if the weather had been favorable it is certain there would have been 19 times as many contestants as there were. He personally knows, he says, of 17 farmers who made drags and then left them at home on account of the weather, and all, he says, promised to bring them to Moline April 15.

Following are the cash prizes proposed for the Moline contest:

\$25 for drag coming longest distance, drawn by team.

\$25 for drag coming longest distance, drawn by auto.

\$10 for drag coming second longest distance, drawn by team.

\$10 for drag coming second longest distance, drawn by auto.

\$15 for drag arriving at Market square first.

\$10 for drag arriving at Market square second.

\$5 for drag arriving at Market square third.

\$10 for drag and auto coming longest distance over Rock River Valley Route.

\$10 for drag and auto coming longest distance over Scenic Route.

\$10 for drag and auto coming longest distance over Scenic Route.

\$10 for drag and team coming longest distance through South Moline.

\$10 for drag and auto coming longest distance through South Moline.

\$10 for first lady on drag at Market square having ridden on same from her home.

\$5 for second lady on drag at Market square having ridden on same from her home.

\$10 for lady having ridden on drag over most miles of road.

\$3 for lady having ridden on drag over second most miles of road.

\$5 for heaviest team of horses on drag.

\$5 for most expensive auto with drag.

In addition to the cash prizes a large number of prizes will be given to all participants.

A. E. Nissen has consented to be chairman of a committee of three who will be judges of the contest.

Few Changes in Conditions.

Conditions for the contests will be similar to those which governed in Rock Island. Mr. Nissen suggested today that only farmers or renters residing in Illinois outside of city limits of city of Moline, and who are actively engaged in farming at present time be eligible to enter.

No metal or drag which is manufactured or sold will be considered. Drag may be split log or plank, but the split log drag as recommended by D. Ward King is preferred by the committee in charge.

POLICE SEARCH FOR YOUNG GIRL

Eleanor Holland of Madison, Wis., Thought to Have Been Abducted and Brought Here.

Moline police are scouring the city today in an effort to locate 14-year-old Eleanor Holland of Madison, Wis., thought to have been abducted from her home by a man twice her age. She was accompanied by the man when last seen, which was yesterday morning.

The local police have received but few details, the information coming in a brief telephone message late yesterday afternoon. A description of the man and girl was furnished and the police asked to watch all incoming trains. The police were also asked to search among the people of a certain nationality here for the couple. It is because there are so many people of this nationality in Moline that the Madison police thought it possible the Chicago couple might have come here.

Chicago police are also on the lookout for the two, the girl being of a prominent family, it is said.

SUIT IS STARTED TO RECOVER \$700

George Stiles Construction Co. Sues City for Varnish Work on City Hall.

Announcement is made today that the George Stiles Construction company will begin suit against the city in order to find out who shall pay \$700 for varnishing the interior of the new city hall. It appears, according to City Attorney James Johnston, that the man who was engaged to do the varnishing was let out by the construction company, and that he is now bringing suit against the company to recover the \$700 said to be stipulated in the contract.

The city has the money ready to be paid for the work, but is at a loss to know to whom it shall be paid, and for that reason the courts will be asked to decide.

TEACHERS' EXAMINATIONS FRIDAY AND SATURDAY

POLLS ARE OPEN; REGISTER TODAY

Last Chance to Those Who Wish to Vote Next Tuesday at Township Elections.

Today is the final day for registration of qualified voters of the township who desire to vote at the spring township elections and on the local option question at the polls next Tuesday, April 7. The polling places will be open today until 9 p. m., according to notice issued by Town Clerk George Gould.

WALKS OFF OF A MOVING FREIGHT

Charles Van Doorne of Chicago Seriously Injured in a Peculiar Accident.

Charles Van Doorne, who claims Chicago as his home, was hurled from a freight car traveling at the rate of 30 miles an hour last evening about 6 o'clock and is now in the Moline city hospital in a critical condition. The accident occurred near Colona. After regaining consciousness, the injured man walked all the way to East Moline, a distance of eight miles, arriving there about midnight.

He told the police that he had crawled into a box car at Blue Island, intending to come to Rock Island. Before the train reached Colona he was sound asleep but the bumping of cars caused him to awaken. He got up while still partially asleep deliberately stepped out of the doorway. He was thrown 20 feet, his body being badly bruised and his head and face severely cut.

Retrenchment Extended.

Pittsburgh, Pa., March 31.—Retrenchment of the Pennsylvania lines west was extended today with the announcement that 10 passenger trains, six of them suburban, would be taken off the Pittsburgh, Fort Wayne & Chicago railroad next Sunday. Shop forces are being reduced.

POLICE CAPTURE A YOUNG BANDIT

Nine-Year-old Rock Island Lad Starts Career of Crime in Moline.

OFFICERS FORM DRAGNET

Steals Bicycle in Plow City and Attempts to Rob Rock Island Drug Store When Captured.

Police of Rock Island, Moline, Davenport and East Moline, formed a dragnet last night in an effort to capture a lone bandit who was known to have operated in the tri-cities. The capture was effected late last night when Harold Smith, who lives in Rock Island, and who has just celebrated his ninth birthday, was taken into custody while attempting to burglarize the drug store of Oscar Oberg, 628 Thirty-eighth street, Rock Island.

His depredations started in Moline late in the afternoon when he stole a bicycle belonging to Harold Hayes, 617 Twenty-first street, this city. The cycle was standing against the curb on Fourteenth street and Fifth avenue, and the police were notified immediately after the loss of the wheel was discovered.

Dragnet Is Formed.

Not knowing that they were dealing with so young a bandit, the police of this city phoned to the police of the surrounding cities, with the result that the boy was arrested.

Resting against the curb was the stolen bicycle and the youthful bandit confessed to the depredations.

It is charged that Smith took a broom handle and broke the window at the Oberg store for the purpose of stealing a toy bank he saw in the place. He was arrested by Officer Lloyd. This morning a petition charging delinquency was filed in county court by Assistant State's Attorney A. C. Edwards and it is expected that the hearing will be held this afternoon.
