

### JUMPS OR FALLS INTO RIVER FROM THE HELEN BLAIR

D. B. Kenehan, a Stranger, Mysteriously Disappears on the Trip North.

### BOAT WAS NEAR MUSCATINE

Conflicting Stories Led to Doubt of Sanity—Supposition is That He Was Drowned.

D. B. Kenehan, a passenger of the Helen Blair, is believed to have drowned in the Mississippi several miles below Muscatine about 10 o'clock last night. Whether he fell in accidentally or jumped in with suicidal intent probably will never be known.

The fireman saw him walking around on the lower deck of the boat. The former turned to throw some coal in the fire and when he turned back the man was missing. The captain was notified and the boat stopped and a life boat lowered. The searchlight was employed for some time but no trace of the unfortunate man could be found. The crew searched for the body about an hour before the steamer proceeded on its way.

The ill-fated passenger had no baggage on the boat to positively identify him. He had secured a round trip ticket from Burlington to Davenport under the name of D. B. Kenehan. Passengers on the boat say he had acted and talked queerly all day. He told one of the passengers that he owned a big farm in Colorado, with many thousand head of live stock. He told another that he lived in California and another that Washington, D. C., was his residence. He also claimed to be worth \$150,000.

Heard a Splash. About 9:45 in the evening the captain saw him going down the stairs from the second deck, looking around several times as he did so, as if to see if anyone was watching him. One of the lady passengers claims to have heard a splash. Kenehan sank without a cry.

A pint of whiskey was found in his stateroom, and it is thought probable that he had been drinking. He was dressed as if he were a prosperous farmer and appeared to be about 50 years of age.

The authorities at Muscatine and Burlington have been notified and they are working on the case.

### ORDERS PANEL OF FORTY JURORS TO REPORT IN COURT

Judge E. C. Graves Directs List Be Summoned for Next Monday Afternoon.

### CONTINUING ARGUMENTS

Court Has Not Disposed of Motions to Quash 13 Indictments in the Magill-Bruner Cases.

This morning in circuit court, Judge E. C. Graves ordered a panel of 40 jurors summoned to report next Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The list was chosen by Circuit Clerk George W. Gamble, County Clerk H. B. Hubbard and Acting County Judge B. S. Bell, as is the usual procedure and the summons was turned over to Sheriff O. L. Bruner to serve, although there is a probability that he may be one of the defendants to be tried by the jurors called.

The jury is not summoned to try the Magill-Bruner cases or any other specific matter. It is called to hear any cases that may be for trial next week. As yet Judge Graves has not disposed of the motions to quash the indictments in the 13 Magill-Bruner cases and until these have been disposed of, there is no matter for trial. It is anticipated that the court will make a ruling tomorrow.

### Arguments Continue.

Arguments on the motion to quash continue. The Martin Nolan matter was first taken up and now the Mitchell case is being discussed. John and Thomas Mitchell are alleged to have paid Magill and Bruner the sum of \$100 to secure their release from county jail before being brought to trial, Magill, Bruner and Ben Schriver, attorney for the Mitchells, being indicted for conspiracy and bribery. Each indictment is being taken up separately and discussed.

Yesterday afternoon Attorney Kenworthy in making an argument before the court, declared he had been criticized for his arraignment of the board of supervisors and its alleged conspiracy to "get" its enemies. "I have been condemned for attacking the county board," he declared, "yet this board is being attacked on its own record, on its own course of action."

Cyrus Dietz, counsel for Mr. Magill commented on the strange fact that the grand jury had voted a true bill implicating Magill, after the examination of the same witness and hearing the same evidence in the same case earlier in the session when not a true bill was found.

### Drawn in Chicago?

That the indictments drawn against L. M. Magill and Oscar L. Bruner were drawn in Chicago, was admitted in an informal manner in circuit court this morning by George W. Wood, special state's attorney. Whether or not this fact will have any bearing on the legality of the indictments returned remains to be seen.

A Total of \$253 Has Been Turned in to Commissioner Bear for Independence Day.


Sixty people have contributed to the Sane Fourth of July fund and a total of \$253 is now on hand for use in the celebration.
