

NEGRO WHO CAME HERE WITH WHITE GIRL IS PINCHED

Brothers of Margaret Gietz Give William Clay Severe Beating After Chase.

WANTED TO GET MARRIED


Couple Alleged to Have Eloped From Muscatine but Inmate Relatives Spoil Their Plans.

Three angry brothers, following a colored man from Muscatine to Rock Island, alleging that he eloped with their sister, finally captured him near Fourth avenue and Fifteenth street, at 8:30 o'clock this morning, and very likely would have killed him had it not been for the intervention of a local citizen.

The elder brother drew a gun and pointed it directly at William Clay, the colored man, but Dr. R. M. Pearce prevented any tragedy that might have followed, by stepping in front of the state relative.

Clay left Muscatine yesterday afternoon, and Margaret Gietz, the girl, aged 19 years, left last night. The three brothers learned this and headed for Rock Island. A girl friend told the brothers that their sister had intended eloping with the negro. They immediately set out for Rock Island arriving here in the night and this morning commenced their search, finally locating the colored man near the court house. The negro was locked up at the station and the three men were detained, it being hoped by the police to locate the girl here at which time charges will be preferred against the colored man.

in the same neighborhood in Muscatine as the Gietz family. It seems that he has been paying attentions to Miss Gietz and that her family strenuously objected.

After the colored man left Muscatine yesterday afternoon and his departure was followed later by the disappearance of the girl from home, the brothers who had always been strenuous in their objections to the negro being about the Gietz home, started an investigation.

The negro came to Davenport and spent the night at Mrs. Green's boarding house on Fifth street, this morning coming to Rock Island.

He alleges that he has a sister, Mrs. Brooks, who resides in the lower end of town, and that he came here to visit her before departing for Wisconsin, where he was going to take up work.

When the three Gietz brothers found him walking along Fifteenth street, near the court house, they surmised that he was going into the building to secure a marriage license and that he had the girl with him here.

They immediately chased him and when he saw them, he ran to Third avenue and boarded a Long View car, which was proceeding south. The three picked up stones and ran after the car, boarding it in the middle of the block.

Flash Revolver at Him.

The colored man got off at Fourth avenue and started running west but the Gietz boys caught up with him. He was thrown to the ground and the elder of the three drew a revolver from his pocket and flashed it at the negro.

Dr. Pearce who chanced to be passing, prevailed upon the man not to shoot and thus prevented what easily might have been a more serious affair. One of the brothers ran to the police station and Officers Charles Ginnane and Gus Kirsch went to the scene and took all four into custody.

But the negro told a good story when he was later questioned by Chief of Police James Brinn. He said that he did not bring the girl here, did not know she was in Rock Island, nor was he acquainted with any of her actions during the past few days. He said that he had not bothered the Gietz but did not deny that he lived in their neighborhood or knew the girl.

The brothers did not see the girl leave with Clay but they say that they are positive that the colored man prevailed upon their sister to leave Muscatine with him.

The case as it stands at present is not a strong one against the negro, and although he ran from the brothers when he saw that they were in the city, which would be an indication of his guilt, yet the police feel that there is not sufficient evidence to hold him, unless they get the girl.

Believe Girl Here.

The officers have an idea that Margaret is either in Rock Island or Davenport. It may have been that she joined Clay in Davenport and that in order to be cautious Clay came to Rock Island alone, possibly to secure a marriage license.

The officers want to get Clay on a charge of violation of the Mann act and for that reason details of the case were kept very secret at the police station.

ENTERS RACE FOR CHICAGO JUDGESHIP




Miss Nellie Carlin.
