WAGNER'S REVIEW

At a 200,000,000 Clip.

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 25.—North America is exporting wheat at fastest clip since the 1901-2 and the 1902-3 years.

The United States at a rough guess will probably clear near 44,000,000 wheat and flour for July and August vs. 37,000,000 for same period of 1902 and 59,000,000 for 1901.

The present pace is a full 200,000,000 bushels per year pace. Our greatest exports for the years ending July 1 follow: 1908, 163,000,000; 1903, 202,000,000; 1902, 234,000,000—the last being the record since 1891.

During the past two years the United States has averaged 143,000,000 for its annual wheat and flour exports. The present export pace has arrived at

a crucial moment. It supports theories of a finally closely marketed crop.

The wheat market promises to be influenced by heavy shipments for another month or two. Ultimately, of course, Russia will loosen her 80,000,000 to 100,000,000 surplus.

The wheat and oats markets have been under war influences for 26 days, and the bull spirit is far from exhausted. There is an outpouring of bear theories, but they are likely to have little effect for another month unless peace hoves in sight.

There are private guesses on corn of 2,300,000,000. Last August the private estimates were about 2,000,000,000. Corn market is due to be resilient until well into September.

Our own idea of the corn crop is that the United States will raise 300,000,000 above 1913. We believe in high prices for another year, but also believe fair sized reactions are certain.

Export news on oats indicates that the United States has already sold 5,000,000 to 8,000,000 abroad, and may sell 12,000,000 to 15,000,000 more. There is only one key to the oats market—the export news. Bullish possibilities do not appear exhausted.

The 1913 corn condition last September was about as bad as any crop will ever attain—at 65 per cent. In comparison with 1913 the 1914 crop is 5 to 7 per cent superior. August weather illustrates this fact. If the 1914 crop is finally given as 2,400,000,000 then the 1913 yield was 2,100,000,000.

Drift of the Weather.

Morning Grain Letter.

Chicago, Aug. 25.—Wheat tone is regarded as somewhat hesitant. Small break expected, but exports are too large to permit of serious break.

Bears say May wheat is best sale if a further bulge. Most important morning news concerns the report that England is raising 2,000,000 men and preparing for a long war.

Corn belt was cool yesterday with rains in Illinois, Indiana, Missouri, Oklahoma and the northwest. Corn is considered in a two-sided position. Trade leaders are mixed. Some of them think old corn has reached a bull limb and the new crop months cannot advance. It is high time some exporter tells the truth on export oats sales. If we have sold 6,000,000 to 8-

000,000 abroad the oats will break but little. Oats visible is nominally liberal.

Corn lacks the reinforcement of dry hot weather which is ever a valuable adjunct. Normal cost of exporting Chicago wheat to Liverpool is around 15 or 16 cents. Present cost is 23 cents. There is much local talk that all grains and products have had good advances. Local paper says the corn belt has not only received best rains in some time, but the cool weather will conserve the moisture.



WEATHER CONDITIONS.

Low and relatively low, pressures prevail on the Rocky mountain plateau and in the west gulf sections and the lower Mississippi valley, while an area of high pressure and cool weather overlies the territory from Alberta, Montana and Wyoming eastward to the St. Lawrence valley. Showers and thunderstorms have resulted on the eastern Rocky mountain slope and in the Missouri, Mississippi and Ohio valleys and Tennessee. Heavy frost is reported from Yellowstone park and the temperature fell to the freezing point at Swift Current. On account of the low pressures to the southward and the presence of the northern high, unsettled and continued cool weather

is indicated for this vicinity tonight and Wednesday.
