Blue Sox Tie Count in Fifth, but Johnson's Triple Breaks Up the Game.

PEORIA STILL HAS CHANCE

Moline Loses Third Straight to Watchmakers—Cummings Wins for Champs—Hustlers on Top.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 5.—All speed-boat records will be broken at the American championship races to be held here Sept. 19-26 according to the estimates of the drivers in this part of the country. The racing game, with the exception of the Peoria contests, has not been a success so far this year but all of the boats of class in the country have been entered for the Chicago meet and as the course is one of the best in the world a speed of at least 60 miles an hour is expected.

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EXPECT BREAKING OF BOAT RECORDS

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The boat which is expected to show this speed is the Disturber IV, the new 40 foot hydroplane with which James A. Pugh went to England last July in his endeavor to win the British international contests. Pugh was unable to show what his boat could do in England, as the races were called off on account of the war, but before leaving for the other side he had driven the 1,800 horse powered craft 59 miles an hour in the one of the three trials he gave it in Chicago.

H. H. Timken of Detroit and Canton has entered his famous Kitty Hawk and believes this time he will be able to overcome the hoodoo which has held him in its grip all year. The Kitty Hawk is a tremendously fast craft and if Timken gets it going properly he will be a favorite along with Pugh and Blackton for the American championship.

Blackton has entered his famous Baby Reliance and Speed Demon and is out to repeat his triumph of 1912 when he swept the cards at the races here that year. Last season Pugh turned the tables on him with the famous Disturber III, but Blackton has faster boats this year.

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ONLY NINE BAT .300 OR BETTER

National League Shy on Good Hitters This Year, Figures Show.

Chicago, Sept. 5.—Only nine batters in the National league are in the .300 class, according to averages published here today. Ross Erwin, with his average of .348 acquired in 29 games with Brooklyn, is leading. Next are Dalton, Brooklyn, .338; Becker, Philadelphia, .317; Daubert, Brooklyn, .317; Connelly, Cincinnati, .314; Grant, New York, .313; Margo, Philadelphia, .310; Connelly, Boston, .306; Phelan, Chicago, .304; Wheat, Brooklyn, .299. With three men among the leaders, Brooklyn is setting the pace for the clubs with .269 and New York is next with .261. James, Boston, with 29 wins and 6 defeats; Rudolph, Boston, with 19 and 8, and Mathewson, New York, with 21 and 9, lead the pitchers. Herzog, Cincinnati, has most stolen bases, 41.

In the American league, Joe Jackson, Cleveland, has regained the leadership with .362. There are only 11 .300 hitters in the American, and next to Jackson they are Collins, Philadelphia, .354; Hohlitzel, Boston, .354; Cobb, Detroit, .351; Mitchell, Washington, .350; Cree, New York, .333; Speaker, Boston, .333; Baker, Philadelphia, .333; Crawford, Detroit, .323; McInnis, Philadelphia, .310; Walker, St. Louis, .308. Philadelphia, with .271, and Detroit with .251, lead the clubs, while Maisei, New York, is leading base stealers with 52. Leading pitchers are Bender, Philadelphia, 14 and 2; Leonard, Boston, 19 and 5, and Plank, Philadelphia, 15 and 4.

Bennie Kauf, the Federal league's "Ty Cobb," continues in front of the outlaws, with .367. Then follow Evans, Brooklyn, .353; Lennox, Pittsburgh, .345; Eastery, Kansas City, .335; Shaw, Brooklyn, .331; Chase, Buffalo, .331; Oaks, Pittsburgh, .324; Crandall, St. Louis, .324; Scheer, Indianapolis, .322; Rousch, Indianapolis, .320. Indianapolis leads in team hitting with .266, and Baltimore is next with .273. Kauff, with 55 stolen bases, is the best in that department. Best pitching is being done by D. Ford, Buffalo, 15 and 5; Hendrix, Chicago, 31 and 9, and Kaiserting, Indianapolis, 14 and 6.

RACES AT PARK WILL BE UNIQUE
