During the retreat of the British toward Paris their battery was surprised by a force of German infantry at Campelme. The British officers were soon placed hors de combat, and one by one the guns were silenced until there remained but one gun, that which was served by Derbyshire and Osborne and Major Darrell, who stuck to their posts regardless of their wounds. It was this gun which silenced the German pieces one by one, until finally the Germans abandoned their position.

CITY DECIDES TO OPEN THE STREET

Dr. Perry Wessell and W. H. Christison Donate Land to the City for Purpose.

After negotiations extending over a period of several years, arrangements have been completed for the opening of Fourteenth street between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth avenue, and the opening of Twenty-seventh avenue from Fourteenth to Fifteenth streets. Dr. P. H. Wessell has agreed to deed land, which he owns, for street purposes, and W. H. Christison previously had promised to deed a portion of his land. Dr. Wessell called at the office of the mayor yesterday afternoon and had a conference with the city's executive, the city attorney and members of the city commission relative to the opening of the street, and following the meeting the doctor signed papers transferring his title.

ROCKEFELLER IN NOT GUILTY PLEA

Former New Haven Director Arraigned and Placed Under \$5,000 Bond.

New York, Nov. 5.—William Rockefeller, charged with conspiracy in connection with his acts as former director of the New Haven railway, pleaded not guilty when arraigned in court today and was placed under \$5,000 bond.

Rockefeller appeared feeble as he walked unsteadily from his automobile into the building. He leaned heavily upon his stick and his personal counsel. The first time in the memory of New York newspaper photographers Rockefeller consented to pose for the photographers. He stood patiently in the sunlight. Asked by photographers if he had anything to say, he shook his head and pointed to his throat. "I can't talk," he whispered.
