

PLAN INSPECTION ST. JOSEPH JAIL IN NEAR FUTURE

Committee of Board of Supervisors Expect to Visit Missouri City.

INVESTIGATE WORK HOUSE

Feature in Davenport Structure is Approved by Some of the Members of Body.

The jail building committee of the Rock Island county board of supervisors will likely go to St. Joseph, Mo., in the near future to inspect the county building at that city, which is said to contain many of the features which the majority of the members of the local committee want in the next structure here.

The battle in the Missouri city has the residence in connection with the jail. Other modern ideas used there are said to have appealed to the committee. It is probable other cities with up-to-date jails will be visited.

The committee adjourned until Monday, when it will meet again to map out an itinerary.

Want Work House.

The committee is anxious to get all the information possible before taking definite action on the new structure. On the trip to Davenport yesterday the jail there was inspected in detail. A work house is maintained in the basement of the institution and some of the committee favor provision for this feature in the structure here.

Supervisor S. E. Wright has consistently fought for the establishment of a place where county prisoners could be put at work, and in this way help pay for the maintenance. It has been his idea, however, that a stone quarry should be purchased by the county and the scheme be put on a broad basis. Others who are opposed to the quarry think the work plan should be

considered in connection with the erection of the jail, and this may be done.

CARRIER SERVICE AGAIN EXTENDED

More of New Territory Gets Free Delivery—Later Collections.

Two important extensions in the carrier and collection service of the Rock Island postoffice were put into effect today, including carrier service in the portion of the new territory bounded by Eighteenth and Twentieth avenues and Twenty-fifth and Twenty-seventh streets, wherein all the requirements as to walks, street lights, house numbering and mail receptacles have been complied with, and the filling in of a gap in the evening collection service for street letter and package boxes extending from Eleventh to Eighteenth streets and between Eleventh and Sixteenth avenues.

AID SOUGHT WIFE FORMER RESIDENT

Mayor Interests Self Securing Help for Family of Booth Hawkins.

Mayor H. M. Schriver this morning received a letter which informed him of the death of Booth Hawkins, formerly of Reynolds and who at one time was a schoolmate of the mayor. The letter was from T. W. Marshall, Port Williams, Ontario, Canada, and stated that Mr. Hawkins passed away Dec. 14, in Port Arthur, Ontario. It stated that his wife and children were in destitute circumstances and that financial help was necessary.

The communication also asked the publication of the facts, claiming that relatives of Mr. Hawkins are residing in Rock Island county. Mayor Schriver has taken more than usual interest in the matter in view of the old ties the letter recalls and asks that any who are interested in the lending of assistance to the woman and children, should communicate with him.

PROJECT FAVORED BY NEW CITIZENS

Board Local Improvements Accordingly Passes Proposed Watermain Extension.

TO COST ABOUT \$11,000

Public Meeting Held in Mayor's Office Shows Property Owners in 142-Acre Tract Progressive.

Property owners in the 142-acre tract of land, recently annexed to the city from South Rock Island, heartily favored the extension of watermains into the territory at the public hearing held before the board of local improvements this morning.

Accordingly the members of the board unanimously adopted the project and recommended same to the city council for final approval.

The project provides for the laying of 10-inch watermains on Ninth and Twelfth streets, from Alken to Brashar streets and an 8-inch main on Brashar street, connecting those on Ninth and Twelfth streets. The improvement will cost about \$11,000 according to the estimate of City Engineer Wallace Treichler.

First Act Jurisdiction.

The calling of a meeting for today by the board of local improvement was the first act of the city in exerting jurisdiction over the new territory. The meeting was decided upon when the board was in session the day following the annexation of the tract. The approval of the property owners on the project did not come as a surprise as many had indicated from the start that they were in favor of the extension of public improvements into the territory, and it may be that others will follow soon.

The new citizens are gradually realizing the benefits derived from annexation, including free mail service now being given those in the new tract who have complied with the requirements relative to sidewalks and house numbers.

Carlisle Indians Off Football Schedule for First Time.

Philadelphia, Jan. 15.—Four new games—Pennsylvania State, Pittsburgh, Albright and West Virginia—are on the University of Pennsylvania 1915 football schedule just announced. For the first time in more than twenty years the Carlisle Indians do not appear. Other teams dropped from last year's schedule are Gettysburg and Swarthmore.
