

ARRESTS FOLLOW MOLINE ELECTION

Four Men Are Detained By Police as Result of Gambling Exposure Made By Pastor.

E. L. EASTMAN ACTS PROMPTLY

Investigators Are Said to Have Received \$100 and Then Left Town Hurriedly.

Five arrests were made yesterday as the result of publication and distribution early Tuesday morning of a circular, signed by the Rev. R. H. Haney, in which the good faith of Commissioner E. L. Eastman, then candidate for reelection, was questioned.

Arrests were made by the Moline police acting on orders from Commissioner Eastman. The men in custody are five of those named in the circular as having gambled in a place at 1614½ Third avenue.

Investigators Wanted.

The police of Moline are looking for the two investigating men who in affidavits admitted having gambled. Warrants for their arrest have been issued. These men left Moline immediately after the affidavits were sworn to and the police have not yet been able to locate them. It is understood that each of the three men who made the investigations received \$100. Who paid them is not known.

The men under arrest are Roy Young, 1614½ Third avenue, Cal Harvey, 1614½ Third avenue, Harry Sorenson, alias Whitney, Sam Williams, alias Louis, and David Thomas. They will be given a hearing tomorrow.

NEW COUNCIL TO ORGANIZE MONDAY

Announcement Made By Mayor Martin E. Carlson Following Consultation With Attorneys.

Newly elected commissioners of Moline will organize next Monday instead of May 1. Announcement to that effect was made this morning by Mayor Martin E. Carlson following a consultation with City Attorney James Johnson.

The statute governing the commissioners form provides that the newly elected commissioners shall organize at the first regular meeting after their election. Under city ordinance the next regular meeting of the council is next Monday, so the new council must organize at that time, explained the mayor.

The new commissioners will have to give bonds and qualify immediately. Each must also publish in the papers before that time a statement as to how much he spent for campaign purposes. Under the state law they will have until Sunday to do this.

Assignments to the various commissionships are made by a majority vote of the council. There will be no contests, however.

BOARD READY FOR DISSOLUTION NOW

Sears Administrative Body Automatically Ends With Passage of Union Ordinance.

BUSINESS CENSUS ALMOST FINISHED

Federal Appointee Also Near End of Labors in Davenport But Moline Is Unfinished.

The taking of the business census in Rock Island has been practically completed by John Coburn, federal appointee, who is in charge of the work. That of Davenport is also almost finished but there is still considerable work to be done in Moline in connection with the task.

The census is being taken for the department of commerce and all manufacturing industries are visited and detailed information, which is confidential, is secured.

Publication of information secured by the census taker is not permitted and is secret. It is to be known by only Mr. Coburn and officials in the department of commerce.

The cost of manufacture and the sale price is secured of all materials, inventories of the stock and goods, value of property, amount of stocks and bonds, is some of the information secured.

The salaries of the officers, office employees, salesmen and factory workers, is also demanded and the number of workmen employed each month for 1914 is also taken.

Mr. Coburn has been at work for about a month in the tri-cities and will complete his labor within the next few weeks.

ASKS ATTORNEYS TO SET DOCKET

Trial Calendar in County Court Will Be Arranged at Session Tomorrow Morning.

USING UNEMPLOYED AS JURORS

Last Two Panels Called Composed of Men Out of Jobs—Declared to Have Proven Capable.

Judge N. A. Larson has requested all attorneys interested in civil cases pending to appear in county court tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock to set the docket. These cases begin Monday.

Although the list of civil suits not disposed of is much smaller than usual, there still remain a large number which the Judge is anxious to have heard as soon as possible. Attorneys are privileged to name the dates for the hearings, but if they fail to appear tomorrow the county judge will take matters in his own hands before the weekly work starts.

A jury will be in session during the trials. Sheriff Richmond experienced little difficulty in procuring men to serve at this time, farmers excepted. Most of the men will be recruited from the ranks of those still unemployed.

The last two juries assembled have been obtained from men in this category and the county judge declares that in his experience he has never dealt with more capable jurors or better informed.

MOLINE WOMAN IS VICTIM OF THIEF

Mrs. J. L. Oakleaf Parts With Costly Rugs When Man Represents Himself as Driver.

Rugs valued at \$250 were stolen yesterday from Mrs. J. L. Oakleaf of Moline. A man representing himself as a representative of the Kerler cleaning concern of Rock Island called at the Oakleaf home for rugs which Mrs. Oakleaf had asked the company to clean. They were given to him.

A half hour later the Kerler truck stopped in front of the house and the driver said he had come for the rugs. Told that a man had already called for them, he stated that he was the only employee of the Kerler company who called for rugs and the other man must have been an impostor.

A telephone call to the Kerler company verified the second man's statement. The police were then notified.

It is thought the rug thieves have carried on their operations extensively. Now the man knew Mrs. Oakleaf had intended to send the rugs to the Kerler plant is a problem. The one solution offered so far is that he tapped the telephone wires of the Kerler company.
