

ROUTE CARRIERS FAR AS CENTER STATION JULY 1

Extension of Mail Delivery Into New Territory Authorized by Postal Department.

RECEIPTABLE MUST BE PROVIDED

Free Delivery in Sears and Immediate Vicinity Hoped for in the Course of Short Time.

The Rock Island postmaster received this morning authority from the postoffice department in approval of his recommendations to make numerous extensions of the free delivery service into the newly annexed territory on the south side, and also into other parts of the city not already served by carriers.

The district into which Postmaster Simpson proposes to give free delivery service commencing July 1 will include:

once provide a suitable private mail receptacle, or have a slot cut in the door, for receiving mail. No house not so provided will be served.

The continuation of the service thereafter will be contingent upon establishing permanent sidewalks and crossings and numbering of the houses according to the law.

The postmaster is preparing individual letters to every householder in the territory, setting forth these conditions, and hopes that the requirements as to mail receptacles will be fully complied with by July 1, as he is not empowered to leave mail at any house which is not supplied with this convenience.

The postmaster is now working on a scheme to extend free delivery service to Sears and the immediate vicinity at the earliest date possible, but under the rules of the department it will have to be accomplished gradually.

NO RESTRICTIONS FOR BIG PARADE

Committee in Charge of Fourth of July Event in Moline Extends Invitation to Public.

The parade in Moline on the morning of July 4, an important part of the Fourth of July celebration in that city, is open to all, marchers, horse-drawn vehicles, floats, autos, bands, etc. First decision of the parade committee was that automobiles only would be permitted to take part in the event. A change in the plans was made, however, the committee having decided that the parade is for, by and of the people of Moline. To make it of greatest interest to all, it should be thrown open to all.

Request is made by the committee that those intending to enter the parade advise the chairman at an early date as possible, that position in the formation may be best assigned. The committee expects to take care of a large number of entries at the last moment, but it will greatly expedite matters if the chairman knows intentions of each organization and individual early.

Attention is again called to the fact that the Fourth of July falls this year on Sunday and that the celebration will be Monday, July 5.

The complete program is not yet ready for the printer but this much may be safely stated—the parade will be the big event of the forenoon; the afternoon will be devoted to athletic and aquatic events at Prospect park; then in the early evening all will gather in the natural amphitheatre around the lake for the patriotic service. Following the exercises the sky will be illuminated in colors; fireworks to the value of some \$2,000 being discharged.

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COUNTY BANKER'S YEARLY SESSION

Big Delegation From Rock Island and Moline Will Go to Reynolds This Evening.

AUTO RIDE AND CHICKEN SUPPER

W. G. Eckhardt, Farm Agent of DeKalb County, Will Speak at the Session Later.

This evening the annual meeting of the Rock Island County Bankers' association will be held at Reynolds, on invitation of the bankers of that village. A big delegation from Rock Island and Moline will go to the meeting place on a special car on the Rock Island Southern which leaves here at 5 o'clock and will return immediately after the session. Aldo bankers will be present also.

Those attending are promised an automobile ride through the rich farming country near Reynolds and an old fashioned chicken supper served by the ladies of the Methodist church afterward.

Eckhardt to Speak.

Farmers of the locality will participate in the main session, which will be addressed by W. G. Eckhardt, a Buffalo Prairie boy who is now farm agent in DeKalb county, the first to hold such a position in this state. His remarks are expected to show the value to this locality of such an office and to help in bringing nearer the day when an organization shall be effected to provide for such a service for the farmers here.

THAW ON STAND SAYS HE IS SANE

Believed When Leaving Mattawan He Had Entirely Recovered His Mental Balance.

New York, June 22.—Harry K. Thaw took the stand today as the first witness in the trial before a jury to determine his sanity.

John B. Stanchfield, in opening Thaw's case, told the jury the main question at issue was whether Thaw is sane at the present time, and whether his liberty would be a menace to society. The attorney quoted William Travers Jerome, Thaw's prosecutor, as saying also that "no one pretends that Thaw is insane as he now sits in court."

Thaw, in escaping from Mattawan insane asylum, violated no law, declared Mr. Stanchfield.

"He walked out because he believed he was sane and was being illegally detained," he continued. "This he told to the jury that tried him for conspiracy to escape from Mattawan and the 12 jurors acquitted him."

Before Thaw was presented to testify Deputy Attorney General Cook declared that the state had no interest in the case other than as to whether Thaw was insane and a menace to society.

"We will show that he is suffering from incurable insanity," said the state's attorney. "That his paranoia was in evidence throughout his youth."

Thaw was then called to the stand. Mr. Stanchfield began to question him in a low tone of unmodulated tones. He identified his mother, sisters and brother, who were sitting in the courtroom, at the request of the attorney.

"When you left Mattawan did you believe you had recovered your sanity?" he was asked.

"I believed I was sane," said the witness.

"Physicians had told you so?"

"They had."

Thaw was taken over the history of his escape to Canada and his subsequent movements. He gave names, dates and places in great detail without hesitation.

Thaw told of the examination of his sanity made Manchester by the federal commission in connection with the proceedings to extradite him to New York. He named the members of the commission and told how it came to be appointed.

"Physicians representing a Pittsburgh bank had also come to see me in Manchester," said Thaw.

"This Pittsburgh bank honored your check, did it not?"

"Yes, and the banks in New Hampshire, Canada and elsewhere," said the witness.

Mr. Stanchfield then turned the witness over to the state's attorney but Deputy Attorney General Cook announced that he would not then cross-examine Thaw. Thaw was then excused and with grave demeanor returned to his seat at the counsel table.

DICE REAPPOINTED REPORTER IN COURT

Edwin H. Dice, of Rock Island, court reporter in the Fourteenth Judicial circuit since 1904, was reappointed to that position by Judge W. T. Church this morning. Mr. Dice was first appointed by the late Judge Bigelow.
