JOINT COMMITTEES IN SESSION

Chicago delegates, who represented 14 lodges from that city at the recent meeting of the commanders and chapter in this city, expressed themselves in favor of retaining the home in Rock Island. The home is ideally situated on a spot on Rock river just west of Strayer's crossing.

INSTITUTE PLANS HAVE BEEN MADE

Capable Corps of Instructors Secured for Annual Gathering by Miss Lou Harris.

Plans have been completed for the annual institute of the teachers of Rock Island county which is to be held at the Rock Island high school building, Aug. 30 to Sept. 3. All those who expect to teach in this county the coming year are required to attend.

Miss Lou M. Harris, county superintendent, has arranged an unusually strong program. W. H. Cheever of the Wisconsin normal, is to teach pedagogy and the science of teaching. Grin Veener, instructor in one of the Nebraska normal schools, is to discuss problems in discipline. Miss Mabel Bragg, Boston, and Miss Maude Goudy of Iowa City, will present primary reading and methods.

Reuben Post Halleck, Louisville, Ky., is to lecture on psychology. Problems in school teaching are to be considered by E. E. Van Cleave, Macomb normal, and C. A. Faust, Chicago, will teach writing.

Under the provisions of the new school law, physical training is required in grade schools. Miss Anna Casey of this city will give teachers' instruction along this line. Two other instructors of this city have been secured, Miss Millie Beck to teach music and Miss Alta Thompson to present poetry and literature in the grades.

Rock Island members of the Woodmen of the World drill team are experiencing military discipline at the encampment at Camp Badger, Milwaukee, this week. Reports from the Cream city show that everything is being conducted along army lines and the local men are enjoying themselves and incidentally perfecting themselves in military tactics.

According to Quartermaster General J. W. Croft there are 150,000 Woodmen drilled and fully equipped with the exception of guns, ready for service in the regular army on a day's notice should this country go to war with Mexico. General Croft said that the Woodmen had officially offered their services to President Wilson at the outbreak of the Mexican trouble and that the offer still holds.

WILSON ORDERS TROOPS HELD FOR EMERGENCY ALONG MEXICAN BORDER

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Besides the governor, Adjutant General Henry Hutchings, John N. Garner, congressman from Texas, and other prominent citizens of the state, were to discuss the border situation. Further proof that the outbreaks are due to a conspiracy of Mexicans from both sides of the Rio Grande was to be laid before Governor Ferguson.

That the raiders are acting under

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the "plan of San Diego" was indicated in the reports of United States army officials reaching the headquarters of the southern department at San Antonio. The reports quoted from literature said to have been distributed in large quantities in the border counties of Texas.

The killing of a Mexican, supposed to have been a member of one of the bands of marauders at Mercedes, Texas, last night was the latest death to be reported in connection with the outbreaks. Near Mercedes three Mexicans had been killed several hours previously and 22 horses belonging to the raiders captured.

Numerous unconfirmed reports of killing and battles between the raiders and soldiers reached here.

Another Zapata Defeat. Galveston, Texas, Aug. 13.—Zapata forces, which some weeks ago occupied Mexico City, have suffered another defeat at the hands of General Coas and have been driven back into the

state of Morales, which Zapata has controlled for several years, according to advices to the constitutionalist consulate here today. Operations against the Zapata forces are being pushed vigorously, it is said.

News from Mexico City, received at the local consulate, is that food prices are being reduced and that there is a large daily distribution of food to the poor. It is also reported that bankers and business men have sent a cordial note of thanks to General Carranza for the assistance given in relieving the financial situation in the capital after its occupation by General Gonzalez.

It is said that General Carranza will publish his manifesto to the American people and his correspondence with the American state department when the result of the peace conference is known.
