

FLORAL SHOW AT PARK IS PLANNED

Superintendent Chris Gaetjer Says in Another Year Chrysanthemums Will Be Displayed.

HAS HOT HOUSE AT LONG VIEW

Raised 700 Plants of All Colors and Varieties This Season—to Erect New Building.

The Argus was presented this morning with a bouquet of five beautiful chrysanthemums by Chris Gaetjer, park superintendent. The flowers were raised at Long View and are fine specimens. Mr. Gaetjer says he has about 700 plants in the small hot house which has been erected there and that he hopes in another year to have an additional building so that the public can be invited to attend a floral exhibition.

Extensive plans are being made for Long View park next year. In addition to the hot house, it is proposed to erect an inn where refreshments can be purchased. Mr. Gaetjer has for a long time been figuring on improvements at the park to increase its popularity and usefulness and believes that within another year some of his ideas can be materialized.

NEW CHINESE ENVOY TO UNITED STATES

Washington, Nov. 1.—The state department has just been informally notified that Dr. Vi Kyuin Wellington Koo has been appointed Chinese minister to the United States, succeeding the present minister, Kai Fu Shah.

Dr. Koo was graduated with high honors from Columbia university in 1908, a year ahead of his class. He was one of the first students sent to America by the Chinese government through the Boxer rebellion indemnity, remitted by the United States, and acquitted himself with great credit.

He is well known here and includes among his friends many leaders in educational, professional and financial circles. While a student at Columbia he was the editor-in-chief of the Columbia Spectator, the university daily paper. In 1909 he was made master of arts and for three years thereafter studied under John Bassett Moore.

Only recently he was appointed envoy to Mexico, Peru and Cuba and passed through Washington on his way to London, prior to taking up his official position. At that time he was presented to Secretary Lansing and discussed the Mexican situation with him.

PEST HOUSE NOW PRACTICALLY NEW

City Commission Inspects Building Which Has Been Remodeled During Past Summer.

COST OF WORK NEARLY \$2,500

Six Rooms Added, Plumbing and Heating Installed and Place Is Made Modern in Every Respect.

No longer can critics take a "slam" at Rock Island's pest house, located in the west end of the city. This is based on the findings of the Rock Island municipal commission which today inspected the detention hospital. About \$2,500 has been spent on the building to make it modern, convenient and suitable to the needs of a pest house.

In the past the building has been the object of much criticism and even ridicule because of the lack of facilities with which to properly conduct the hospital. Men and women in many cases were not segregated and patients suffering various stages of smallpox mingled together.

The detention hospital has been remodeled the past summer, however, so that all the inconveniences have been eliminated.

No Longer Inadequate. In the past the building also has been found inadequate in size and the work of remodeling included the addition of six rooms for patients. Plumbing and heating of modern type have been installed.

Commissioner Liedtke directed the changes in the detention hospital and at his invitation the commission inspected it today.

BARBERS FINED IN SOUTHERN ILLINOIS



RAILWAY IS JOLTED OVER LACK OF HEAT

Failure of the Tri-City Railway company to keep its cars properly heated was discussed at a special meeting of the Rock Island commission today. Commissioners Liedtke and Rudgren reported having received numerous complaints from patrons of the lines. Other members of the council joined in expressing dissatisfaction with the company's neglectfulness. "It wouldn't take us five minutes to remedy the situation if we had the power of the state public utilities commission," said Mr. Rudgren. It was agreed that the council could do no more than request the company to see that its

cars were heated. If immediate attention to the matter was expected, inasmuch as a complaint to the utilities commission would not be taken up for months.

Attorney William McEniry was allowed \$250 for services rendered in defending the union ordinance in the courts.
