

### VILLA CONCLUDES FIVE DAY RETREAT

Sisters, Students and Visiting Friends Participate in Religious Event.

REV. BROCKMAN IS IN CHARGE

Brilliant St. Louis Minister and Writer Preaches Series of Timely Sermons.

The usual routine of school was resumed yesterday at Villa de Chantal following a five days' retreat participated in by the Sisters of the Visitation, students and visiting friends in Rock Island, graduates living in Chicago and other points nearby being in attendance.

Masses were heard each day, commencing at 8 in the morning, followed by instructions at 9 and 10 o'clock, 2:30 and 4:30, ending with benediction at 7:30.

The ceremonies were in charge of Rev. Hubert F. Brockman, S. J., of St. Louis. Father Brockman is assistant editor of the Queen's Work, a monthly magazine of Catholic activities, named in honor of the virgin Mary, and the official organ of sodality in America and published at St. Louis. Villa de Chantal is affiliated with the Sodality of the Blessed Lady.

Father Brockman is noted for his breadth of view, and the school was accorded a privilege in receiving instruction from so well equipped source and in the excellence of the sermons made especially interesting to the young ladies and children. He has aroused the enthusiasm of the pupils in the Catholic foreign missions and they have in formation the project of "buying a Chinese baby," that is, the school will undertake supplying all the needs of a mission Chinese baby, clothing, food, education, and will be accorded all rights of supervision, except actual possession of the living doll.

One of the most beautiful expositions touched upon by Father Brockman was that entitled "Love of Christ and His Compassion for Sinners," illustrating how Jesus denied all the charges brought by the Romans against Him, sedition and other crimes, but did not refuse his association with publicans and sinners. From this theme he drew the associate moral of

the necessity of seeking out sinners by Christ's example and one's unashamedness of the action and accusations brought in this day by the worldly.

He also charged the young women when they have graduated to take active interest in organizations affecting the welfare of women, as women's clubs and similar associations and in woman suffrage and in every way exercising an active part as the home duties which they have or assume will allow. He foresaw in this a great good toward the uplift of humanity and furtherance of civilization through the refining influence of pure and devout Catholic women.

Favors Vacation Schools.

Father Brockman earnestly advocated the establishment of vacation schools, conducted in summer for city children, using the parish schools as nucleus. This work could well be taken up by young girls, he argued, student bodies like the Villa, and much inspiration was gained from his remarks. "Great spiritual good is bound to result from the short respite from school activities and devotion and attention to the soul's needs.

The services ended Sunday morning with celebration of the Feast of the Presentation. The altar was lovely with white flowers, a cluster of Jacquemint roses placed beneath the Sacred Heart. Father Brockman made exposition of the blessed sacrament and administered the papal benediction. While in the city he was a guest at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Shields, 1628 Twenty-second street.

### PEORIA LID IS OFF; DETECTIVES SPOT

Injunctions May Now Be Asked to Enforce Sunday Closing Law in Distillery Town.

ARRESTS ARE TO COME SOON

Majority of Three Hundred Bars Reported to Have Been Doing Business Yesterday.

Peoria, Ill., Nov. 23.—Investigators operating under the direction of Arthur B. McCoid of Chicago, Sunday amassed evidence against practically every Peoria saloonist. This evidence will furnish the foundation of the attack on the Sunday opening of saloons.

The reports of the investigators are to be written up today and tomorrow, and about Sunday everything will be in readiness to cause warrants to be issued for the arrest of saloon men. Prosecution will be based on charges of violating the state law, it is said.

Mr. McCoid revealed another step that is likely to be taken in case trial by jury on the state charge fails to attain the desired result.

Injunction proceedings to restrain liquor dealers from operating under their city licenses will be the second line of attack. It is the claim of the Chicagoan that all saloon licenses are invalidated the moment the saloon opens for business on Sunday, and that any court will declare them void and lapsed. The city could do this if it so desired, McCoid says.

This is based on the Sunday closing provision of the city ordinance which is also incorporated in the licenses issued by the city.

It was reported about the city that some of the saloons were closed during the day. In order to fight shy of the spotters, a reporter asked Mr. McCoid if his men had reported any of the places closed. He replied that if any were closed, the seven men in his employ had not been successful in finding those places.

He further asserted that the effort of the Retail Liquor Dealers' association in prohibiting the selling of bottled goods during the day had gone for naught.

"My men know what whiskey is," said the Chicagoan, "and the little additional evidence we could have secured through the purchase of bottled

goods would avail little when we get into court.

Plenty of Finances. "They think we have not the proper finances to fight these cases," he continued, "but right now we have all the funds available that a reasonable man could ask. Certainly these people would whistle if they knew how much we have, and the sources it is coming from.

"We will prepare the evidence that our investigators gather today. There are seven of these men, some from Chicago, and others from Peoria. That is enough to look after 300 saloons. About the middle of the week we'll begin getting the warrants.

"It is a mistake to think we can't get the proper sort of jury in Peoria. I know it can be done. The liquor dealers dare not carry their case to the appellate court."

harmonious conditions may be established.

"Right spiritual knowing or real thinking expresses the activity of truth in consciousness. The knowing of God is the appearing of Christ in us. This healing consciousness comforts the sorrowing, brings hope to the infidel, awakens the sinner and heals the afflicted by destroying the darkness of error with the light of Christ, truth.

A Necessary Discrimination.

"It is thus seen that Christian healing is not brought about through hypnotism, will-power, or mental suggestion in any form, for these methods all involve belief in the reality of matter and evil and simply effect the exchange of one belief for another. They depend wholly upon the influence of one human mind over another and the danger of this method becomes apparent when we recognize that the quality of the mind may be evil and may thus transmit evil. In Christian science healing the human mind is not a factor, for the healing power is divine truth, which dispels error and its effects. The human will does not enter therefore into the operation, even as in correcting a mathematical error we do not use will-power but perceive the error as such and apply the corrective truth.

"One of the cardinal points in Christian science healing is to recognize all disease and sin as mesmerism and as no more a part of man than it is of his Maker, the infinite divine principle. "Writing to the Romans, St. Paul says: 'The good that I would I do not; but the evil which I would not that I do. Now if I do that I would not, it is no more I that do it, but sin that dwelleth in me.'"

"In conformity with this statement of the great apostle, Christian science teaches that the evil is not the man but is always impersonal and only acts insofar as it is believed to be true by deceived human sense, and this separation between man and false material belief has a very significant relation to the healing of sin as well as disease.

Human Sense Healed.

"The healing work is accomplished in the human mind by bringing about a change of consciousness wherein lies the belief in error which has to be corrected. This human mind is that quality of consciousness which embraces error and yet which can begin to know divine truth. It is the plane on which the real can reach the unreal. It is a kind of clearing house where truth can be known, where error can be corrected and where harmony can be established. It is a transitional stage of experience in which transformation takes place, through the renewal of the mind. It is an imperfect consciousness, still influenced by error, but one to which the saving Christ can come, healing it of its erroneous beliefs and renewing it with the mind of Christ. Mortal mind or the carnal mind is wholly evil and erroneous but the human mind, although containing much error, possesses also some good. It is this element of good which is quickened and enlarged through the appearance of the Christ in consciousness, and which will eventually be so transformed that all error will be destroyed and the perfect, spiritual, harmonious consciousness of the real man be established.

"Christian science heals sin in the same manner that it heals sickness, by recognizing the fact that evil is the opposite of good or the absence of good, and thus has neither principle nor power; that it is no part of God's creation since in the infinity of good there can be no place for evil. It shows that evil is a lie, a liar, and the father of it," as Jesus termed it, and that it exists in the human consciousness only as a false belief of good.

Three Modes of Healing.

"Christian science healing reaches the individual in three ways. First, through reading of Christian science, or hearing it spoken. This healing is accomplished when the truth of the written or spoken word enters a receptive consciousness and brings about a change in the quality of the thought, so that there is an awakened interest, a new viewpoint, a clearer vision, an uplifted sense, a removal of fear, a yearning satisfied, the darkness of evil dispelled, and the brightness and power of good made manifest; the majesty, glory and presence of infinite divine mind revealed. This improved consciousness is then externalized in improved bodily conditions, and health and harmony are expressed. It surely proves the divinity of Christian Science for the healing is solely the result of the declaration of divine truth.

"Second, healing is effected through the effort made by a persons to apply the principle and rule of Christian science to his own problem. This is accomplished by the study of the bible and the Christian science text-book and by application of the Master's teaching in a scientific way, whether it be a case of disease, sin or other discord. This healing likewise results from the destruction of erroneous be-

Speaker at Meeting of American Society of Chemists Declare They Are Affinities.

FROM SAME PRODUCTS

Here are a chemist's definitions:  
MILK—Hydrolyzed Carbonaceous infusion, with or without flavoring substance.  
BEER—Fermented carbonaceous infusion with or without flavoring substance.

Beer and milk have similar characteristics, are of nearly equal food value, and are produced in the same manner, according to Dr. Edward Godeman in an address last evening before the Chicago Chapter of the American Society of Chemists.

"Beer and milk are affinities," said Dr. Godeman. "Both are produced from similar raw materials. In one case the materials pass through a mechanically operated contrivance called a brewery. In the other the materials pass through a more animated contrivance owned and operated by a female animal.

"The changes due to metabolism in the brewery and in the digestive organs differ so little that an analysis of both beer and milk show the following: Water, 85 per cent; acidity, 2 per cent; ash, 3 per cent; difference, 14.5 per cent.

"We can make milk into beer, and in fact, there are products on the market now made in that way. Koumiss is milk with an alcoholic fermentation of 2.4 per cent.

SAYS IT HAS FOOD VALUE

"Has beer a food value? I don't think anyone will deny that it has a great food value, nearly equal to that of milk. It is a food, a condiment, a stimulant and sometimes a delicacy.

"Why do men drink beer? Some of them for the food value, ignoring the taste and the aroma. Others for the taste and aroma, ignoring the food value."

Dr. Godeman advocated the setting of a standard for beer similar to that placed on milk. The standard, he said, would only determine the maximum amount of water to be placed in the brew. (Chicago Herald, March 11-1914)

iefs by the presence of divine truth and love in consciousness.

"Third, healing is effected through the effort made by one person to apply the truth to the problems of another person. The possibility of one person healing another through mental endeavor has often been doubted and misunderstood, especially in Christian Science healing where there is no transfer of mortal thought. This healing is explained by the fact that a problem presented for solution becomes the practitioner's problem and is affected by his thought of truth. When one knows the truth and reflects it, that consciousness becomes more spiritual and everything included in it and to which it is directed is benefited thereby. The patient asking for treatment has at least a slight degree of faith or expectancy and if he is earnest and honest he will get the benefit of the truth which is known about him and which is brought to bear upon his problem. In Christian science treatment there is no effort at mental manipulation for the mortal mind is not a factor in the healing.

"Christian science heals through the operation of divine law, the law whose principle is infinite spirit, life and love, and anyone can heal through Christian science who will apply this law of God exactly and honestly.

"Each of us can begin today to improve our thought and life. We are thinking something all of the time and we can begin to think more of what is good and true, bearing in mind the supremacy of good and thus increasing its presence in our consciousness. We can begin to think more about life than death, more about harmony than discord, more about joy than sorrow, more about love than hate, and with earnest desire and honest endeavor our faith in God will grow until we begin to experience some of the 'peace of God, which passeth all understanding.'

"The love and gratitude which Christian Scientists feel toward Mrs. Eddy is not to be wondered at when one takes into the account the great good which has come into their lives as the result of her teachings.
