

## JURORS RECALLED BY JUDGE CHURCH

State's Attorney F. E. Thompson Petitions for Return of September Secret Body.

### AN EMERGENCY IS THE REASON

Richard McDole, Charged With Burglary, Has Tuberculosis in an Advanced Stage.

Acting on the petition of State's Attorney F. E. Thompson, Judge W. T. Church in circuit court yesterday afternoon ordered that the members of the September grand jury be recalled, to report Tuesday morning, Nov. 30, at 10 o'clock.

According to the petition of the county prosecutor an emergency exists, which is the reason for the action taken. Richard McDole, bound over for the alleged theft of billiard balls from Trinity Episcopal church, is said to be afflicted with tuberculosis in an advanced stage and it is claimed would

be unwise to continue his incarceration.

The petition declares: "Special occasion has arisen since the dismissal of the grand jury heretofore impaneled in this court at this term, requiring that the said grand jury be recalled. Dr. A. N. Mueller, county physician, has notified the state's attorney that Richard McDole was bound over to await the action of the grand jury on a charge of burglary and larceny and that said prisoner is suffering from tuberculosis in an advanced stage and that a longer incarceration in the county jail would be a menace to himself and to the health of the other prisoners.

"Your petitioner further shows this honorable court that there are many prisoners in the county jail, charged with diverse felonies and misdemeanors cognizable only by the grand jury, some of whom have been awaiting a hearing for practically two months. These are matters which can be disposed of in no other way than by the grand jury, and unless the grand jury impaneled for the present term of court as aforesaid is recalled the cases will not be heard until the convening of the grand jury for the January term, 1916.

"The persons charged with these crimes are entitled to a hearing and should have an early hearing and presentment made by the grand jury, especially so that those against whom the grand jury may not return a true bill may be discharged."

## BURGLAR ENTERS BIJOU POOL ROOM

Gets \$15.50 in Silver and Pennies. But Overlooks \$20 in Bills in the Cash Drawer.

### COMPLETELY RANSACKED PLACE

Gains Way Through Basement and Trap Doors With Use of Crowbar—Leaves by Same Route.

The Bijou pool room in the 1600 block early today was ransacked by a burglar, who got \$15.50 in silver and pennies and probably made away with some stock. Twenty dollars in paper money in the cash register was overlooked.

Entrance was gained through the basement by forcing in a door in the alley. The burglar lighted some paper in the basement to show him the way to the stairs leading to the pool room proper. After getting to the steps he secured a crowbar with a crook in the end and forced one of the planks of the trap door from its fastenings.

With the board off he shoved the crowbar and his arm through the opening and then proceeded to pry open the trap door. Accomplishing this it must have required considerable labor from the appearance of the floor and door, both of which showed many marks where the point of the bar struck.

After entering the pool room he rifled the cash register and other drawers back of the counter which contained pennies. He attempted to break into the safe, it was thought today, since it was only with difficulty that it was opened by the proprietor.

### Clerk Makes Discovery.

The burglar left the room the same way he entered. The job was discovered this morning by James Brough, the Bijou's clerk. The police were notified. Managers Kain and Reinhardt were unable to say whether or not any stock was stolen since only a complete inventory would show whether anything other than money was taken.

Six weeks ago amateur prowlers broke into the Bijou by climbing a telephone pole in the alley and forcing open the transom. Jewelry given away with punch boards was the only article taken at that time.
