

## SEEKING LICENSE FOR SALOON CAFE

Lon Meumann Petitions Commission for Permit to Conduct Restaurant on Second Floor.

### COUNCIL IS TO DECIDE POLICY

Two Officials Will Investigate Application and Report at the Next Meeting.

The city council yesterday decided to make two investigations. One is to determine what the policy of the council shall be in reference to licensing saloons to be conducted in rooms over saloons, and the other is on the advisability of having new maps made showing the watermain and sewers in the city.

The matter dealing with cafes was brought about through a petition made by Lon Meumann for a license to operate a cafe over his saloon at 1515 Second avenue. He presented the required bond with his application.

Commissioner Rudgren raised the point that the petition opened a new question to the council, inasmuch as it is the first license asked for a restaurant in rooms over a saloon. He stated that the permit issued to Emilie Jenish is for a cafe in the rear of his saloon, 218 Twentieth street.

Mr. Meumann told the council that the second floor of the building occupied by his saloon is one large room. He stated that it could be entered by a stairway from the street and that he intended to conduct it along the same lines as other cafes, dispensing food and drinks.

Mayor McConechie suggested that Commissioners Rudgren and Liedtke visit the place and report at the meeting Monday.

### Consider New Maps.

Commissioners Juhl, Liedtke and Martin and City Engineer Wallace Treichler were appointed a committee to investigate plans for making maps of the city showing watermain and sewers installed here. Information regarding the location of both is often needed and without plans much difficulty is encountered.

According to plans suggested, if the committee finds it advisable to order the maps, separate ones would be made of each of the systems. They

## HEADQUARTERS OF SUFFRAGISTS IN CHARGE OF VOTER

Washington, D. C., Dec. 8.—If Washington has any misgivings as to the effect of the ballot upon American womanhood, the National American Woman Suffrage association is determined to give the community some comfort and reassurance.

To this end it has put a full-fledged "woman voter" in charge of the joint headquarters which have been established in advance of the annual convention of the association which takes place Dec. 14 to 19. She is Mrs. Esther G. Nielson of Denver, Colo. Those who are greeted by Mrs. Nielson will be hard put to it—so the suffragists say—to find any evidence that the contact with the ballot has done anything disagreeable to Mrs. Nielson.

Contract which the city has had for years with the Rock Island Turner society was terminated by the commission. The council paid the organization \$100 for the annual rent for the ambulance shed on the property in the rear of the Turner hall and on ground adjoining the city hall. The shed was built by the city and has been used as a place to keep the ambulance and patrol when separate horse-drawn vehicles were used. Since the motor combination patrol-ambulance is in service the shed is no longer needed. Commissioner Rudgren was authorized to serve notice on the society that the city had vacated the shed and that the contract is terminated.

## VILLA STUDENTS IN LITERARY CONTEST

Seniors of Villa de Chantal have responded to the invitation of Illinois Wesleyan University of Bloomington to take part in a literary contest being promoted by that institution. Sister Mary Regis, teacher of the department of English at the Villa, received a letter from Theodore Kemp, president of the university, in which he outlined the conditions which also affords opportunity to aspiring students to earn \$55 for the best essays on the subject, "Why I Wish to Go to College." Twenty-five dollars is offered for the best paper, the other ranging in points to the fourth best, which will bring \$5. Those whose essays rank fifth, sixth and seventh will be given honorable mention and to the schools which furnish first, second or third successful senior a banner or pennant is to be presented as trophy. Three judges will be chosen from Bloomington who are neither personally nor through members of their families connected with any academy eligible to take part. Only those academies which are accredited on the list of the University of Illinois may participate.

Aside from the stimulus of perhaps being among the fortunate ones the attempt is expected to prove helpful beyond any monetary value. Students who have thought little about college may be brought to consider the matter more seriously by becoming interested in preparing papers on the subject.

Those who are successful will be notified about Jan. 20, and Jan. 28 a bulletin will be issued by the university containing the results, together with the winning essays, and these bulletins will be sent to all seniors of the competing schools.


