STOCK EXCHANGE DULL FIRST HOUR

Little Activity Shown On Market With Continued Heaviness in All Mexican Shares.

New York, Jan. 14.—During the dull first hour on the stock exchange today the market was diverted by activity in manipulative specialties, but heaviness again ensued when selling of Mexican stocks, notably smelting and petroleum, was resumed.

War shares like Crucible Steel and Baldwin Locomotive also denoted pressure of liquidation and United States Steel fell back half a point from its rise to 85%.

The only constructive feature of the morning was the further activity in Mercantile Marine issues, preferred shares rising 2 1/2 to 80% and the 4% certificates 1 1/2 to 99%, both new records.

BEARISH EFFECT TRAILS REPORTS

News of An Advance in Freight Rates to Europe Had Lifting Tendency in Wheat.

Chicago, Jan. 14.—Rumors that fresh advances in freight rates to Europe was probable had a bearish effect today on wheat. In this connection, Liverpool reports said that buyers were holding off on the chance that the British government might intervene to control the rapidly growing tendency to raise vessel charges.

Later, the market suffered a further drop, owing to reports that a bill to remove the Canadian duty on wheat had been introduced at Ottawa.

Better weather weather conditions eased the corn market. Longs showed a disposition to realize profits.

An additional decline resulted from advices that corn was being bought to come here from Kansas City.

penings on her eastern front. The Austrian military authorities affirm that the sole accomplishment of the Russians to date has been the pushing back of one Austrian battalion a few hundred yards.

Allied Forces Landing.

Berlin, Jan. 14, by wireless to Sayville, N. Y.—Dispatches from Sofia say that information has been brought there by a person who left Saloniki Jan. 8, that the allies continue to land forces on a considerably increased scale at Saloniki and at Orfano Bay, 50 miles to the northeast of Saloniki.

Despite the heavy forces already concentrated in the Saloniki camp, no purpose of taking the offensive has been displayed on the part of the allies, who, according to this information, have completed their second line of defense and are working to finish the first line.

The allies at Saloniki are said to have grown optimistic and their officers express the belief that they can make a second Ypres of Saloniki.

Other dispatches from Sofia give details of the attack by the squadron of 12 German aeroplanes on the British camp at Kilindir, near Saloniki, on which occasion, it is stated, several confagurations were started by the dropping of bombs. Details are also given of the counter attack by French airmen, two of whom were forced to descend.

William Spengler Files An Answer.

In the petition filed by Otto Zwicker of Sherrard, Ill., Emil Zwicker of Midland, Texas, and George Unterkirchner of Sherrard, Ill., asking to have William Spengler declared a bankrupt, the latter has filed an answer denying all the allegations of the above parties. Mr. Spengler denies he is a bankrupt and asserts he is willing and ready to pay all claims against him shown to be valid.

Accepts Call to Mt. Ida Church.

One of the best news items ever received by the congregation of the Mt. Ida Presbyterian church was contained in information coming yesterday from Dubuque, in which Carl Frederick Wetstein announced he had accepted his declination to accept the call to the pastorate of that church and would accept the same. His acceptance was secured only after a member of the congregation had gone to Dubuque and prevailed upon the brilliant young ecclesiastical scholar to reconsider his former action.


