HIGHER CABLES BRING STRENGTH

Liverpool Quotations Have Stimulating Effect on Prices in the Chicago Market.

Chicago, Jan. 18.—Higher cables quotations put strength today into wheat. Stimulus for buyers was found also in reports of cold weather damage to the fall sown domestic crop.

Opening prices, which ranged from 1/2 to 3/4 higher, with May at 1.29 1/2 to 1.29 3/4 and July at 1.22 1/2 to 1.22 3/4.

Prospects of larger receipts tended to weaken corn. The strength of wheat, however, acted as an offset.

Price changes kept within a narrow range throughout the day. The close was unsettled at 1/4 to 1/2 cent advance.

CHILD MAY DIE OF INJURY FROM FIRE

Clothing of 5-Year-Old Theodore Heitz Ignited by Gas Stove in Basement of Home.

IS IN CRITICAL CONDITION

Mother Has Hand Burned Smothering Flames After Screams of Child Attract Her.

Theodore, 5-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Heitz, 1432 Thirty-sixth street, was probably fatally burned in an accident last night in the basement in the Heitz home when his clothing was set afire by burning papers.

The boy was rushed to St. Anthony's hospital where small hopes are held out for his recovery, according to a report made by Dr. Joseph DeSilva, the attending physician.

The accident occurred in the basement kitchen of the home. Mrs. Heitz was preparing supper and had several kettles on the gas stove.

No sooner had she arrived at daughter's bedroom than she heard the boy screaming. She rushed down two flights of stairs as quickly as possible and found her son rolling on the floor, his clothing in flames, and beside him lay a burning newspaper.

The room was filled with smoke and one of the neighbors thinking the room was afire summoned the firemen from station No. 4.

Neighbors, attracted by the boy's screams, ran into the home and finally succeeded in extinguishing the flames by rolling him in a blanket.
