

## HIGH TAXI FARES GIVEN BODY BLOW

Rock Island Commission Considers Ordinance Fixing Maximum Fees to Be Charged in City.

### REQUIRE LICENSE OF DRIVERS

Salary of Health Commissioner Is Raised From \$600 to \$1,200 Per Annum and Duties Increased.

In order to protect the public from paying exorbitant taxicab fares the Rock Island municipal commission yesterday considered an ordinance presented by Commissioner Liedtke which provides the following maximum rates: Fifty cents from any point in the city limits to any other point, north of Eighteenth avenue.

Seventy-five cents to any point between Eighteenth and Twenty-ninth avenues.

One dollar to any point between Twenty-ninth avenue and the southern city limits.

Fifty cents for each additional passenger.

Three dollars per hour for continued service.

Children under eight years old free and over eight regular fare.

The same ordinance contains a provision that all taxicab drivers must take out a license, fee for which will be \$20 per annum.

Another ordinance considered by the commission increases the salary of the health commissioner, commonly termed city health physician, from \$600 to \$1,200 per year, but increases his duties so that he shall take care of all patients suffering contagious diseases free, providing they cannot pay for the care.

Resignation of Electrical Inspector George A. Kling was read by Commissioner Liedtke. Mr. Kling claims the plumbing and building inspectors receive a larger salary than himself and he states his duties are practically as extensive as those of the others. The commission will consider raising his salary from \$900 to \$1,200 at a meeting as a committee of the whole. Commissioner Liedtke stated that Mr. Kling has proven to be an industrious worker for the city and that the increased salary is just.

### Refuse Saloon Petition.

The commission unanimously adopted a resolution refusing to grant W. C. Mueller, Moline, a license to conduct a saloon at 4332 Sixth avenue. Attorney R. R. Reynolds appeared before the council as representative of residents of the east end, protesting against granting the license. Petitions signed by more than 200 people, protesting against the location of saloon in the east end, was filed with City Clerk M. T. Rudgren.

Contract for furnishing and installing street signs was awarded to the Rock Island Lead Pencil company. The price is \$1,460.

Contract for auditing city books was awarded to Fred H. Satterdahl, who offered to do the work for \$200.

## AUDITOR J. J. BRADY WEDS STENOGRAPHER

James J. Brady, state auditor, opened another chapter in his eventful marital career yesterday. He was married in St. Petersburg, Fla., to Miss Katharine Koch, who has been employed as a stenographer in his office.

Miss Koch was a much discussed figure in Brady's affairs shortly after Mrs. Mary Quinlan Kuhns Brady filed her \$50,000 breach of promise suit against the auditor in 1914, charging that he had failed to reward her as he had agreed on finding that their mar-

riage was not binding because Mrs. Brady had been divorced within a year.

Through the tumult that followed—the first Mrs. Brady made sensational charges of favoritism and mismanagement in the auditor's office—Brady pursued the even tenor of his way calmly in Springfield and was seen so frequently in Miss Koch's company as to occasion a good deal of comment.

Miss Koch, then working in the office of the state treasurer, refused to be disturbed by the gossip, declaring that Brady "had the blues" and needed friendship.

The first Mrs. Brady, who came to

be known as the auditor's "Michigan wife," settled her suit out of court in April of last year. The amount she received was never made public. She charged that Brady was urged to "get rid of her for political reasons" and named a number of state officials in the interviews she gave out freely.

A month after the settlement of her suit her original marriage to Brady was annulled in the Circuit court.

The new Mrs. Brady is a daughter of Mrs. Maria Koch, a widow of Springfield.

Father J. J. Wallace, pastor of St. Mary's Catholic church in St. Petersburg, performed the ceremony, following which Auditor and Mrs. Brady departed by boat for Tampa. They will visit at St. Augustine and other Florida points and then go by boat to New York City, stopping at Baltimore and other points enroute.

Several hundred people attended the funeral of Henry E. Burris, colored, senior member of the Rock Island mail carrier force, at the services conducted this afternoon at 4 o'clock at the Memorial Christian church. Rev. M. E. Chatley, pastor of the church, who was in charge, paid a fitting tribute to Mr. Burris in his sermon. The church choir sang. The floral tributes were numerous and beautiful, especially those from the postoffice and fraternal orders to which he belonged. Members of King Solomon lodge No. 20, A. F. & A. M. and Black Hawk lodge No. 51, W. B. F., and the Rock Island postoffice force and carriers from Moline and Davenport, attended the services in a body. The Masonic

ritual was observed at the grave. Burial was in Chippinnock cemetery.

The active pallbearers were John Slaughter, E. Terry, Charles Golden, Al Houston, John King and Henry Husten, all from the Masons. The honorary pallbearers from the Rock Island carrier force were William G. Kurth, Elmer F. Stroehle, James P. McCarty, John R. Stengel, Theodore Hinrichsen and Herman G. F. Appelquist.
